A CORRESPONDENT OF THE GUARDIAN writes:—"We are pleased to note that Mr. Crozier, the popular and prominent farmer of Coleman, is taking a much needed vacation which he is putting to good use by visiting his relations in New York City. Previous to 1893, Mr. Crozier was a resident of New York City for 12 years, but an attraction greater than the States could produce, drew him back to the country of his birth where he married and since remained. Mr. George Bowness of Kensington showed the GUARDIAN correspondent yesterday an advertisement dated April 18th 1827 published in Newton England, in reference to some property owned by Mr. W. B. Lupin of Westleigh near Bideford, Devon Eng. The make up and wording are quaint and redolent of the ancient days.

"Many a weary year has passed since the burping of Grand Pre, When on the falling tide freighted vessels departed, Bearing a nation, with all its household goods into exile, Exile without an end and example in story.

Far asunder, on separate coasts, the Acadians landed; Scattered were they, like flakes of snow, when the wind from the northeast strikes aslant through the fogs that darken the Banks of Newfoundland. Friendless, homeless, hopeless they wondered from city to city From the cold lakes of the North to sultry Southern savannas."

"All history presents no parallel to the spectacle of the departure of the Acadians. Nations have been put to the sword and peoples not engaged in warfare have been massacred. In our own century the ineffable Turk descended upon a peaceful community during the Grecian war, and wiped it from the face of the earth. But never was a nation rooted out of the soil and ruthlessly scattered to the four quarters of the earth in a brief space, as were the French inhabitants of Nova Scotia. It is strange that so fruitful a theme for the poet and novelist has been so little made of. Longfellow, alone, has immortalized it in his epic, in which, however, while the facts may be idealized, they do not depart in substance from the truth." The market yesterday was attended by a big crowd and the splendid display of flowers interspersed with a generous assortment of nature's products of the farm and garden, made the scene of unusual attraction. Most of the farmers were pleased, for the rain and sunshine had been intermingled in excellent proportion during the past few weeks and the results were most satisfactory. The public, too, who frequent the market had no cause to complain, as all products went at reasonable figures, and there was plenty of them. A large supply of fish was offered. Mackerel sold in the morning at 6c each and in the afternoon the price dropped to 4 cts. Eggs sold for 11c and dairy butter for 18c. On the square hay sold in the forenoon at 40c, but in the afternoon it could be purchased for 32c per cwt. Oats are worth from 38 to 39c and potatoes about 15c.

LAST Sunday evening the Mission Band of the North River Baptist Church, celebrated its fifth anniversary by a sacred concert, in which the young people were assisted by the choir of the church, and Mr. Hugh A. McLean, the Gospel soloist. As usual on such occasions, the sanctuary proved entirely too small for the congregation. The anthems by the choir, and the solos by the little girls were finely rendered. The singing of the children in general also proved very attractive. There were finely presented recitations and an entertaining dialogue by the older girls. A Mission Band exercise by the smallest children was carried out in a praise-worthy manner. Special mention should be made of the singing of Mr. McLean and Miss Elvira Scott.
