THE PARDONING POWER.

SIR,—Much misconception of this matter exists in the public mind, and while the press has given expression to the indignation which exists and righteously exists, we should bear in mind that our Constitution never contemplated that pardon or commutation should be exercised unless good and sufficient reasons were calling for it. The Constitution never intended that ex parte evidence of which the public were kept in ignorance, would be accepted by the executive of the Government responsible for the clemency. Clemency is a virtue which belongs to the legislator, and not to the executor of the laws, a virtue which ought to shine in the code and not in private judgment. The commutation of a crime like that of Carver is to nourish the flattering hope that punishment inflicted is an act of injustice and oppression, that after hearing the evidence in this case the sentence of the court was severe, unjust and wrong, hence the commutation. No one therefore has the right, whatever his power may be to extend a favor to one without extending it to all equally situated and consequently equally entitled to favour. Commutations of sentence in the neighbouring Republic still further erode absolute pardons at a later period. Just fancy, a similar executive ten years hence, on evidence just as flimsy as that leading to the commutation, releasing Carver. Pardoned!

The public have a right to all the facts in this case if law is to be observed as a protection to life and property. Pardon or commutation ought not to be granted except in cases in which absolute justice demands it against the law or for very specific and peculiar reasons. The laws of England absolutely restrict the pardoning power in some instances. No private report by the Judge imposing the sentence should be used unless it also is produced in Parliament where the whole question can be ventilated and brought to light.

No petition, no matter what signatures it bore should be used without the public and the friends of the murdered man were permitted to pass their objections to the views and arguments advanced. The business of a Judge, his duty and habit of thinking are strictly to apply the law. In case of pardon or commutation the object is neither to make nor to apply a law, but to defeat its operation in a given and peculiar case. A careful examination should have been made, open to the aggrieved parties and the public before it was granted. It is now proper that the whole question should be reviewed in Parliament, and all the evidence, documents and reports made thereon should be given to the public.

For failure of this the Government of Canada must be held responsible and accountable to the people.

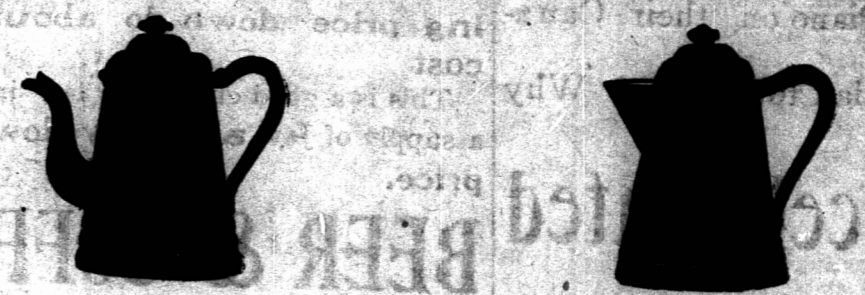
