

RABID GERMAN PRESS SAYS THEIR SUBMARINES CAN DO YET WORSE THINGS

NEW YORK, July 22.—A cable to the Tribune from Lugano says: "The violent attacks on the United States in the government inspired German press which had died down have broken out with renewed violence. The semi-official Rheinische Westphaelische Zeitung, the organ of the coal and iron magnates of the Rhine province says: "The possibility of war with America has recently been discussed in German political circles and this has produced a calling effect on the presumptuous threats of the United States. We certainly did not seek a quarrel with America, but if the American Government protects with its buckler, England, in search of defenders, and if it threatens to oppose our means of attack, our honor forces us to strike at this buckler with our mace of steel. "We see clearly what our fellow-countrymen abroad may have to suffer on this account, what political effect it may have and what material losses we may have to endure, but what are such considerations in the presence of our aim, the encirclement of the British Isles by war. Our submarines are sending ship after ship to the bottom, until the English are tired of such a struggle. We now

know that our submarine war can have a very different consequence if we want to push it to its furthest limits. When the day comes for us to decide to push the submarine war to the extreme neither London nor Washington will try any longer to impose conditions on us by diplomatic notes."

A MAN AND A BOY KILLED BY LIGHTNING

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 21.—Professor Augustine J. S. Bourdeau, aged forty-one, a prominent seventh day Adventist and Edwin Andrews, fifteen, son of an Adventist, are dead and Marguerite Bourdeau, nine, a daughter of the dead man is seriously injured as the result of lightning stroke at Tokoma, Park, Md., a suburb. The three were standing near a tree around the Adventist administration building in Tokoma Park, following an electrical storm late yesterday.

TURKS REALIZING THEIR FATE ARE IN REBELLIOUS MOOD

NEW YORK, July 21.—A cable to the Tribune from Milan says: "Despatches from Salonika paints a sombre picture of conditions in Turkey, particularly in Constantinople. In Adrianople, sedition is spreading among the regiments of the garrison, which refuse to leave for Constantinople because they will be sent to the Dardanelles. A reign of terror exists in Adrianople. It is caused by emissaries of the Young Turks committee. When Enver Pasha arrived there, a plot against his life was discovered. More than fifty officers and soldiers were arrested, conveyed by night across the Jungta River and shot. During his whole sojourn, Enver Pasha did not dare to leave Konak, except at night, and then only when escorted by a number of troops and secret service agents. In Constantinople, Adrianople and other towns and anti-Christian agitation is being fomented by the Young Turks whose committee is sitting continuously. Greeks and Armenians go in terror of their lives."

THEIR MAJESTIES PRAISE CANADIAN RED CROSS WORKERS

LONDON, July 20.—Their Majesties the King and Queen honored the Duchess of Connaught Hospital at Cliveden by visiting it today. The Royal visitors arrived at three o'clock and spent two hours going over the fine riverside estate of Waldorf Astor, on which several additional wings have been built to increase the accommodations of the original hospital. In a quiet way the King and Queen moved from ward to ward speaking to the patients, some of whom were lying on beds in the open air, and others in chairs on the lawn. Col. Hodgetts, commissioner for the Canadian Red Cross, and Col. Gerall, conducted Their Majesties over the institution. The King and Queen expressed their warm admiration for the arrangements made, remarking the high standard of the Canadian Red Cross methods. They also congratulated the women men on their bravery and on the heroic deeds of the Canadian troops. Quite by chance the King and Queen saw the hospital under strenuous conditions. Until today there were comparatively few patients, but just two hours before, Their Majesties arrived 200 new patients fresh from the front, were admitted, bringing the total number of inmates up to six hundred. Major General Hughes also arrived at noon. Altogether, it was a record day commented one of the staff officers "but the high eulogies uttered amply repaid the claims made upon the energies of the staff."

FREE FIGHTS AT SOCIALIST MEETING IN LONDON

LONDON, July 22.—A Socialist meeting held last evening in support of the war ended in a free fight to numbers, made a lot of noise. The meeting was addressed by John Hodge and George H. Roberts, laborites, and Will Thorne, a social democrat, all members of the House of Commons, and Ben Tillett, secretary of the Dock Workers' Union, and among the most uncompromising Socialists in England in the days before the war. Tillett, who has just returned from the front, and who is an out-and-out supporter of the war, was speaking, when several men and women interrupted and urged the belligerent nations should arrange a compromise. This the speaker opposed. Several free fights occurred in the body of the hall as the meeting ended.

MANY CHRISTIANS VITIMIS OF THE TURKS

PARIS, July 22.—A Havas despatch from Athens says: "Turkish military authorities, according to advices received from Vurik (a port in Smyrna on the Gulf of Smyrna), have ordered all Christian women and children to leave the town and go into the interior. Many of the residents refused to obey this order and a fierce struggle followed, in which many were victims. "The Greek Government has received from the porte no reply to presentations regarding the persecution of Greeks in Turkish territory. The delay is attributed to the difficulties of communication by telegraph. "Some of the newspapers are urging the Government to assume an energetic policy in dealing with Turkey."
