### THE HANDLING OF FREIGHT.

There is always some apprehension as the date approaches for the close of navigation, that freight offering for shipment may not be forwarded with required promptness. This year there are large crops, especially of oats, and the harvest being unusually late it is natural that there should be a little more than usual concern on that score. These conditions, together with the unusual delays on the great thoroughfares of transportation on the Mainland of late, have awakened considerable interest.

The Guardian has made inquiries which lead to the belief that the Prince Edward Island Railway can, under fair conditions, handle with promptness and regularly all the produce that will offer for carriage to our shipping ports. Those in a position to know affirm that there are engines and cars enough to transport to tide water in twenty days all the produce that will offer. But something will always depend upon the cars being promptly unloaded and returned.

Here as elsewhere, the railways complain that shippers and consignees are often careless on this score. A car detained on a siding or at a terminal, is out of business just so long as it is kept there uselessly. Where a large number of cars are thus detained it may interfere seriously with the carrying capacity of the road. Shippers will do well to take note of this fact and govern themselves accordingly, especially at a time when there is likely to be a stress of traffic.

There is another contingency to be guarded. It is always possible that an amount of traffic may offer the last few days before the closing of navigation, greater than can be handled in the time available. To obviate this difficulty shippers should lose no time in getting their produce forward as rapidly as possible in order that the traffic may be somewhat evenly distributed over the time yet remaining, and not come altogether at the last moment. In the meantime it is pleasing to assure that under reasonable conditions the Railway is prepared to handle promptly all the freight that is likely to offer.

### RURAL MAIL DELIVERY.

We are shortly to have the mail delivered from door to door in Charlottetown. This privilege has long been enjoyed by the leading British, American and Canadian cities, and the demand for rural free delivery has followed. That, too, is but a reasonable demand. In all cities the people have their letters and papers delivered at their doors, although the post office is comparatively near to all of them, why not have a like service in the country districts, where the post office may be miles distant from many of its patrons?

The main answer until recently in Canada has been the cost of such service. It will indeed be costly, but the popular demand for rural free delivery, and the fact that the Post Office Department is now earning a yearly surplus of a million dollars, has moved the Government to promise that rural delivery will be undertaken, in at least an experimental way. The present Government has done a great work in the way of securing cheap letter postage within the Dominion and beyond, in greatly extending free delivery in cities, in enlarging the number of Post Offices and extending mail routes, while at the same time turning big postal deficits into handsome surpluses.

Rural free delivery simply means that along the routes travelled by the mail carriers, letters, papers and parcels will be delivered into boxes at the farmer's road gates. It is obvious that it will accommodate most persons and be likely to improve self-sustaining in a thickly settled community. And now that the experiment is to be tried, beginning probably

next year, it is to be hoped that it may be tested in Prince Edward Island, which is by far the most thickly populated of any Province in Canada. What say Postmaster General Lemieux?

### THE CITY LIGHTING.

When things go wrong the trouble usually finds an echo in the newspapers, and it is sometimes complained that the faults and failures of individual and public corporations find more publicity than their good acts and efficient services. Be this as it may, there was a time when loud and frequent complaints were made in regard to the electric lighting of both streets and houses. That time has passed and we are now getting a good lighting service.

It is fairly due to the Light and Power Company that this fact should be publicly acknowledged. The street lights, which at one time a good while past, were irregular and intermittent, are now clear and steady. A good improvement is noted also in the electric service for interior lighting. ### Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section (60 acres, more or less).

Applications for entry may be made personally by the applicant at a District Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending home leader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

- (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
- (2) A homesteader may, if he so desire perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.
- (3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).
- (4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.
- (5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the agent for the district of such intention.

Six months notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.
