LEADERS ELECTED - LONDON, May 31 - All three political leaders have been re-elected. Right Hon. J. Ramsay MacDonald, Labor Leader, was elected in the Seaham Division of Durham. The election of Premier Baldwin and Right Hon. David Lloyd George, Liberal Leader, had previously been announced. Mr. MacDonald polled a crushing vote over his two opponents, totalling 35,615 against 6,821 for W. A. Fearnley-Wittingstall, Conservative, and 1,431 for P. C. Pollitt, one of the leaders of the British Communist party who waged a particularly bitter campaign against the former prime minister. Miss George Successful.
