OTTAWA, Dec. 1—(CP)—Montreal tenants, 226 strong, reached Ottawa today to protest to Finance Minister Abbott against increases in rental ceilings allowed by the

Federal Government. The Montreal group was joined by about 50 members of the Ottawa and District Tenants Protective League. Spokesmen said the marchers represented 20,000 Montreal tenants. They were to meet Mr. Abbott at 3:30 p.m. EST today.
