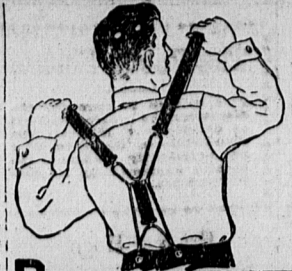

He is well acquainted with another Islander, Mr. A. L. Moore, formerly of Georgetown, who occupies the position of Collector of Customs at San Juan.

CANADA AND COUNTY OF PROSPERITY

An immigrant English farm hand from a prosperous Ontario farmer in Toronto recently, rode from the Government Employment Bureau to his new job in a limousine. "Canada is a wonderful country," he exclaimed to Superintendent Heath. "The first day here and I am going off to work in a 21,000 auto. What would the folks back home say to this?" The Englishman is right. Canada is a wonderful country. Judged by average saving per capita, Canadians are amongst the richest people in the world. According to Colonel A. F. Hatch, retiring chairman of the Ontario Division of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, public deposits in banks and loan companies amount to upwards of two billion dollars, or \$250 per capita. Since 1914 the assets of Canadian banks increased 99 per cent; bank notes in circulation increased 66 per cent; the value of field crops increased 68 per cent; the value of industrial production increased 185 per cent, and population increased about 20

per cent. Another demonstration of the rapid growth of the individual life insurance in Canada is noted in the increase of money invested in life insurance in 1906 there was \$656,250,569 of life insurance in force throughout the Dominion. By 1922 this had reached approximately three and a half billions. In a special interview with Mr. J. H. Castle, Secretary of the Life Underwriters Association of Canada our representative learned that taking the same proportion of increase in life insurance in force between the years of 1914 to the present time, in twenty five years or in 1947 it was estimated that there would be twelve billions of life insurance held by Canadians.

"In 1906," said Mr. Graham, "the rapid growth of the individual life insurance in force in Canada was sufficient to keep in comfort 91,009 Canadians for twenty years or to purchase 162,000 homes valued at \$4,000 each, or to give a thorough education to 260,000 children. The amount of money invested in life insurance in twenty-five years' time in Canada would be sufficient to keep 1,680,000 people in comfort, buy 3,000,000 homes, or educate 4,800,000 rising young Canadians." These statements, and the fact that the commerce of Canada has been well maintained in foreign markets indicates that Canada has called the flag of prosperity to the twelve billions of life insurance held by Canadians.

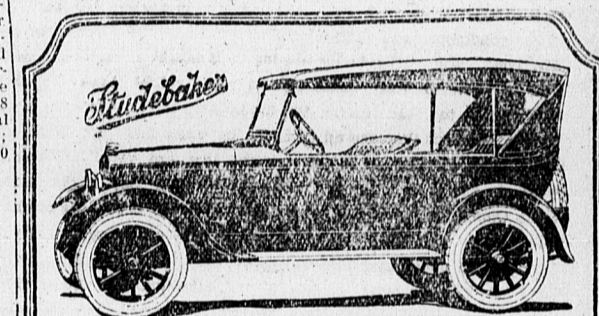
