Rovers Capture City League Flag In Deciding Tilt

Campbell Trophy Goes To Northend Team As Falcons Lose First Bid For City Title By A 10 To 3 Count.

SAINT JOHN BALL CLUB IN N.B. FINALS

MONCTON, N. B. Sept. 4.—St. Peters Baseball Club of Saint John advanced to the finals for the New Brunswick Senior Baseball Championship here today by defeating the Canadian National Apprentices 3 to 2 in the second game of the semi-final series.

Close Decision Brownell, bespectacled southpaw at the St. Peters Club pitched splendid ball today to win a close decision over the veteran Harris Wall of Moncton. He ceded two runs in the third inning, which coupled with two errors, paved the way for both Moncton's runs, but after that he kept the bingles widely separated and finished the game by retiring the batsmen in order in the last two innings, which were played in a downpour of rain.

The visitors tied the score in the fourth by bunting four hits, and snowed over the winning run in the sixth as the result of a hit and a costly error.

The largest crowd of the season watched today's engagement and in spite of the rain, the greater majority of the fans remained huddled on the bleachers and braved the downpour of rain in the last two innings which is testimony to the closeness of the game and the uncertainty of the outcome.

LABOR DAY AT GOLF LINKS

On Labor Day at the Golf Links the following matches were played in the morning: The Men's Sweepstakes Handicap Match, the prizes for which were won by Mr. Harry Sear having the lowest net score of 72, Mr. Robert Holman with lowest gross score of 85 and Mr. Arnold Taylor, who won the prize for the lowest score for the sealed hole.

In the afternoon the putting and approaching, and driving competitions were held. In the former Mrs. H. W. Weeks won first prize for the ladies and Mr. A. V. Saunders and Mr. Arnold Taylor tied for the men, this resulting in a play-off which was won by Mr. Taylor.

Miss Nancy Weeks won the ladies' driving competition and Mr. Robert Holman gave the best exhibition of driving for the men with a total of 612 yards, which was an excellent performance considering the high wind across the fairway at the time.

The mixed foursomes match 9 holes held later in the afternoon was won by Mrs. W. E. Cotton and Mr. Arnold Taylor with the low score of 44.

Next Saturday afternoon the men will go to Summerside to play the first stage of the match for the Gaudet Cup emblematic of the P. E. I. championship. This will be decided by a 36 hole competition medal play 18 holes to be played on the Summerside links and 18 holes at Belvedere on the following Saturday. The cup is at present held by Mr. Arnold Taylor, of the Charlottetown club, who won it last year. It is expected also that the Summerside ladies will be at Belvedere next Saturday to play the first 18 holes for the Simpson Cup. This is the first year for this match, which will be played under the same conditions as the men's championships and the winner will be the lady champion of P. E. I. for this year.

Going on a wild scoring spurge in the opening half of the initial innings which netted them five runs the Rovers representing the Northend of the City, came through to capture the City Ball Championship and Campbell Trophy for the 1933-34 season defeating a fighting but disheartened band of Falcons who saw their hopes of a title go glimmering in the first innings of the game.

The large crowd of fans on hand were treated to a loose brand of ball and not the hard fought tilts which featured the second section of the League.

The Rovers appeared well primed for the fray with the Connors-Francis combination working to perfection, despite the injury to Shono's hand. To name any one member of the winning team as outstanding would be impossible as each member backed the north-end pitcher a hundred per cent.

The Rovers appeared all confident after their opening rally and were content with adding two runs in the fifth and three in the seventh to clinch the game.

The Falcons making their first bid for a city title looked as if they would make a "game of it" in the second and third innings when they sent three men across the platter to make the count 5-3, but from then on it was history, the "Birds" just could not click or fathom the tactics of the Rover battery. The Falcons' heavy artillery failed to function in their usual manner and connected with but a few bingles in the nine innings.

MacFarlane on the mound for the Falcons did some steady hurling, but was found for nine safeties.

NOEL PAUL IS WINNER

SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 4.—(C.P.)—Noel Paul, tireless Indian runner from Springhill, N. S., plodded to an easy victory today over 22 competitors in Cape Breton's second annual Labor Day marathon. Loping along at a steady pace, the Indian marathoner covered the distance in 3:27 10 2-5, winner by four minutes over Desire Philippo of Westmount, N. S. Fourteen contestants finished the grind over wind-swept roads between Glace Bay and Sydney.

BERT PEARSON STAR AT MAR. TRACK MEET

Hamilton Flash Out-runs Halifax Hope — Islanders Secure Places.

HALIFAX, Sept. 4.—Slender young brave of the cinder warpath, Bert Pearson of Hamilton, Ont., Saturday had successfully carried his dashing campaign into the Maritime Provinces.

In a brief, brilliant exhibition at the Maritime track and field championships here Saturday the Olympic Club star almost equaled a Canadian record made a quarter century ago and shattered a Maritime mark that had stood even longer, as well as blasting the hopes of Nova Scotia ascendancy to the championship for the 100 and 220-yard dash.

The Maritime hopes rested on the touselled red head of young Frankie Nicks, Halifax schoolboy who had built for himself a reputation as a smart sprinter. He had little chance against Pearson, however, who pulled away from him in the 220-yard event after passing the half-way mark and finished with a margin of almost three yards to smash the Maritime record of 22 seconds made by Fred Stephen 30 years ago. His time of 21 3-5 seconds was just one-fifth slower than Bobby Kerr's 25-year-old mark of 21 4-10.

Olympic Sprinter's Feats

Pearson had less serious competition in the century which he easily won by flashing ahead of rather slow company in 9 3-5 seconds to equal the mark held jointly by Leigh Miller and Cyril Coffee. He also equaled the track record of 10 seconds in the first heat when he had no incentive to extend himself.

Nicks, with more recognized ability in the 440-yard course, finished second in the 220 yards, badly winded, followed by Freddy Fox of Lunenburg, Nicks, making his entry in senior competition, did not enter the 100-yard dash.

The Hamilton boy, praising the ability of Nicks, said the Halifax youngster had him "a little bit afraid" at times. Pearson said he thought Nicks had a "perfect" stride for a quarter-miler. Other events provided little interesting competition and there never was any need to refer to the record book.

British Challenger Loses Second Race

Gar Wood Retains Harmsworth Trophy By Turning Back Spirited Challenge Of Scott-Payne.

(Associated Press) MARINE CITY, Mich., Sept. 4.—Gar Wood retained the Harmsworth Trophy by defeating Hubert Scott-Payne by about half a mile in the second race of the world's premier speedboat series here this afternoon. The time between the two boats was a little over 22 seconds.

Thrilling Contest The race was one of the most thrilling Harmsworth contests, in which Scott-Payne, piloting a small metal challenger, Miss Britain III, displayed a driving skill rarely seen in Harmsworth races. No less than half a dozen times, in his pell-mell chase after Wood's Miss America X, the British pilot's boat bounced almost clear of the water but with an almost uncanny control of his boat, he kept the craft and roared after Wood.

Only Challenger to Finish Two Races In finishing today's race although beaten, Scott-Payne accomplished something no other challenger ever before had been able to do against Wood—he completed two races against the defender. Wood brought his big boat slowly back downstream after the finish of the race, and waved to the judges and timers. Scott-Payne after hurdling over the finish line, throttled down his craft, and then proceeded slowly to his boatwalk at Marine City.

The time for the race was: Miss America X, 27:49.92, an average of 86.937; Miss Britain III, 28:11.25, an average of 85.7895 statute miles an hour. Wood's 22-second victory today was the closest since he first won the trophy in Osborne Bay in 1920. At that time he won by a margin of 34 seconds over another American entry, Miss Detroit.

Beats Wood Across Line

Scott-Payne had the distinction today, also of beating Wood across the starting line by several boat-lengths. In Saturday's initial heat he was only inches behind the defender at the start. As was the case in the first heat, Scott-Payne again chose to start his boat off in Canadian water, cutting diagonally across the course above the starting line and swinging into line with Wood's Miss America X about half a mile above the line. The British pilot appeared to have timed his start perfectly and shot across the line a few seconds after the gun.

Sports Editor, Ch'Town Guardian, Dear Sir:

I notice an article on the sport page of your paper of Sep. 2nd., to the effect that the Tignish Baseball team has once more won the A. E. Maclean Cup and now became permanent possessors of it. It is my wish that you correct this at the earliest possible moment. Tignish have not won the cup as a matter of fact the team has not lived up to the playoff regulations of the league and is therefore disqualified. The cup this season will go to Grand River who have played excellent baseball and displayed real sportsmanship throughout the season.

The Tignish pitcher, MacDonald, was barred from playing in the league at a special meeting of the executive. Since that time Tignish had to replay all games with Al-berton, and without the services of MacDonald. When the playoffs started they attempted to use him and Grand River protested. I upheld Grand River on the basis of the league ruling and instructed Tignish to play without him. This they failed to do and unless the two teams got together and arrange a quick series I have no other alternative than declare Grand River winners of the Maclean Cup.

If there is any team in the league displeased with this ruling I shall be only too glad to call a special executive meeting and have the decision ratified or thrown out. I hope you will make this clear to your readers as under present circumstances your article in Saturday's issue caused quite a turmoil.
