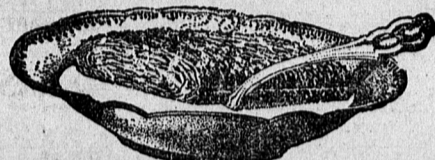

TUESDAY.

POLICE COURT.—At the City Police Court yesterday morning some heavy fines were inflicted on one or two gentlemen who had been drinking not wisely, but too well. Wm. Mahar for having been drunk and disorderly on the 5th inst., was fined \$20 or 60 days, and for a similar offence committed on the 11th inst., a fine of \$20 or 60 days was also imposed. John Gillis on a charge of drunkenness was fined \$5 or 10 days, while Lea Chapman was fined \$2 or 5 days for having been drunk on the 13th. John McAskill, who was charged with having been drunk and disorderly on the 13th inst., was ordered to pay \$50 or 90 days. A prohibition case against Elizabeth McMillan was adjourned to September 19th at 9 a. m.

"SOCIAL SURVEY"—At the Ministerial Association yesterday morning at the Y. M. C. A., Dr. Myers, of Toronto, who is here conducting a social survey of the city, gave an excellent address in which he proposed a survey embracing medical inspection of schools, education, religious conditions, recreation, crime, employment, health and civic conditions. The following resolution was unanimously passed: "Resolved, that we appreciate the outline of social survey of the city as given by Dr. A. J. Myers and that we give it our general endorsement and express the hope that the meeting called for tomorrow evening at the Y. M. C. A. will be largely attended by the citizens. Rev. Mr. H. R. Boyer, District Secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, also spoke, his address being interesting and thoughtful. It was moved and carried that the thanks of the Association be tendered Dr. Myers and Rev. Mr. Boyer for their instructive addresses.

LEAVE FOR ATLANTIC CITY.—This morning Messrs J. McLaughlin and J. J. McKinnon of Charlottetown, leave by the western train for Summerside en route to Atlantic City, New Jersey, where they will attend a meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the I. O. O. F., to be held from September 21 to 26. The meeting will be probably one of the largest ever held and matters of special interest will be brought up for consideration, including the question of the erection of a new temple, the admission of candidates at the age of 18 and the election of officers. The Order has made great strides during the past year and its members now number about two and a half million. The representatives from the Maritime Provinces are Messrs H. F. Meserve, Halifax, D. L. Fraser, Bridgewater, N. S., G. Kent, Truro, N. S., and J. McLaughlin, Charlottetown, P. E. I. Mr. J. J. McKinnon, who will be accompanied by his wife and daughter goes in his capacity as Grand Secretary for the Maritime Provinces to attend a meeting of the Grand Secretaries which will be held at the same time as the Lodges. That the Order is expanding apace is patent from the last Report of the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge, which is a massive and comprehensive volume. It shows the total revenue of last year at \$322,738.38, an increase of \$63,547.52 over that of the previous year. During last year 143,601 brothers and 7,653 widowed families shared in the distribution of relief which amounted to very nearly four million dollars. The increase in the subordinate and Rebeccah Lodges has been substantial and speaks well for the energy and enthusiasm of the members. At the end of 1911 there were over one and a half million subordinate lodge members, two hundred and twenty-seven thousand encampment members, six hundred and eighty-seven thousand Rebeccah Lodge members, and total membership of \$2,080,894. The following year saw an increase in total membership of fifty thousand. Some idea of the power and influence of the Order may be gleaned from the above facts, and to be in a position to attend such a meeting as Messrs McLaughlin and McKinnon will, is an honour and a privilege. Besides Atlantic City they will visit Boston, New York (where they will spend two days) and Philadelphia where, on Saturday afternoon next, they will be present at the unveiling of a table to Grand Treasurer Richard Mackie.

I., and Messrs A. McRae & Son, Charlottetown, who carried off \$199 each. Messrs Roper Bros., Charlottetown, won \$195; Mr. Albert Boswell, of French Fort, P. E. I., \$182; and George L. Boswell, French Fort, P. E. I., \$165. The largest individual winner at the Show was P. S. Snowball, of Chatham, with a total of \$432.

PLEASANT EVENING.—A very pleasant and enjoyable evening was spent on Friday last at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Clark, Experimental Farm, when about thirty young people of Charlottetown, assembled for the purpose of organizing a Young Ladies Aid Society and a Young Men's Bible Class. After business was concluded, games and music were indulged in and thoroughly enjoyed by all. One of the most pleasing features was an autoharp selection by Mr. Russell Fader. Refreshments were then served in Mrs. Clark's dainty style to which everyone did justice. After singing "God Save the King" and giving three cheers for Mr. and Mrs. Clark and family the happy company wended their way home, all expressing the desire that they might soon again meet on such an occasion.

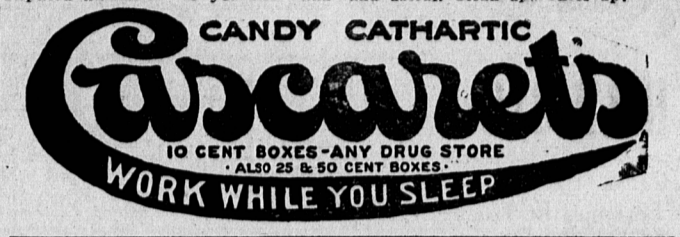
DEATH OF DR. GILLIS.—The announcement is made with regret of the death early this morning, in the Charlottetown Hospital, of Dr. Stephen Gillis, of St. Louis, Prince County. On the advice of his medical attendant, Dr. Dorsey, Dr. Gillis, who had become seriously ill, was on Saturday morning brought down by special train to the city and admitted to the city hospital for treatment. A slight improvement in his condition was followed, however, by a relapse and his demise occurred this morning. An estimable young man, his early death will be a great blow to a large circle of friends and acquaintances.
