—SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—Dr. Wm. R. Wood, D.V.S., of Summerside, met with a serious accident two weeks ago in Montreal. —THE RINK.—The management of the Bloomfield Farmers' Institute special improvements on that building for the better accommodation of the public, besides the sewerage and water connections, carpenters are now at work erecting an addition which will be used as a ladies' waiting room, and the building divided in office, store room and waiting room for the men's waiting room. The work is being rapidly pushed along and the band boys under Bandmaster Gallant, are doing extra work so that everything will be in readiness for the opening of the season's sport.—H.

—RECRUITING CAMPAIGN.—A well attended and fully representative meeting of the citizens of Summerside was held in the Armoury on Wednesday night, ably presided over by Capt. Jos. Read, for the purpose of launching an effective recruiting campaign for Prince County, with the understanding that the recruits obtained will be quartered at Summerside until their departure for the front. Major Inman, Lieut. Moore and Lieut. Dawson outlined what had already been done and what it was hoped to do. Up to date, it was stated, 450 men had been secured; but, allowing for the sick and those who might otherwise fall by the way, another 800 men are required to ensure a distinct Island regiment at the full strength of 1,100. Arrangements are being made to quarter 250 men at Summerside and, if they could be raised in Prince County, that number will be extended to 600. Ways and means to this end were ably discussed by Rev. H. J. Fraser, Mr. A. A. Lefurgey, Rev. J. C. McLean, Rev. C. de Wolfe White, Mr. Alexander Campbell, Capt. Jos. Read, Mrs. A. S. McKay, Mr. Chas. Hensley and others. The following were then appointed a central committee, with power to add to their numbers from all parts of Prince County, to meet at the Armoury the following day at 2.30 p.m., to appoint their chairman and organize a thorough recruiting campaign throughout Prince County: Messrs A. S. McKay, John F. McNeill, M.D.; J. A. McPhee, M.D.; W. B. McNeill, H. T. Holman, H. W. B. Stavert, M. F. Schurman. At the meeting yesterday afternoon Mr. A. S. McKay, chairman of the committee, presided. The matter of a public recruiting meeting on Monday evening was reviewed. Besides the committee, Major Inman and Rev. Dr. Monaghan of Miscouche offered valuable suggestions, the latter offering to assist in any way possible with the work. A committee consisting of H. T. Holman and Dr. McPhee were appointed to arrange a programme, and Dr. J. F. McNeill and W. B. McNeill a committee to arrange a place for the meeting, at which it is expected Col. Campbell, Major Inman and other officers will speak. The meeting then adjourned until tonight at 7 p.m., when the committee will report and the question of organization for the whole County will be taken up.—C.

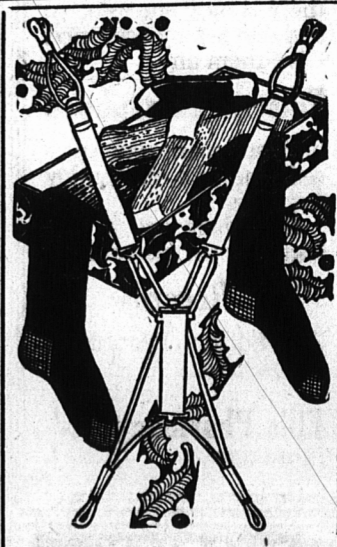

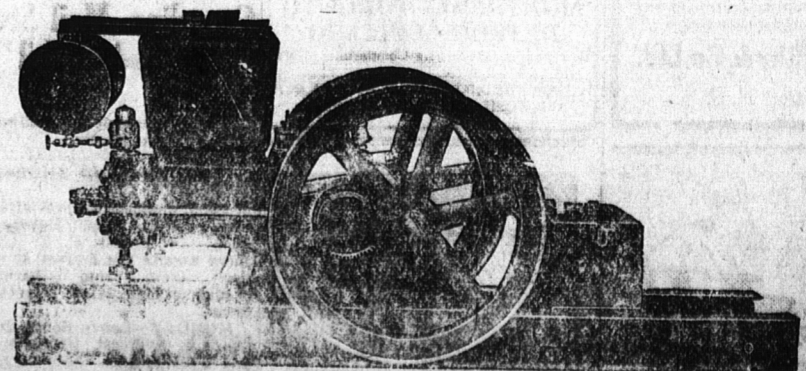
