### TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF LATE DR. BATES

Mark Thornton and wife of East Boston Engineer in the Marine Department of the United States, left this morning for home after a pleasant holiday at Wood Islands where they were the guests of Captain D. I. R. McMillan. Mr. Thornton was an adherent of the Bethel, Meridian St. East Boston, of which the late Rev. Dr. Bates was pastor, whose death took place at his home in East Boston Aug. twenty-eight of heart failure. During his long service in the ministry, Dr. Bates preached the Gospel under the most varied and unique conditions in more than five hundred localities throughout New England. In churches, halls, schoolrooms, camp grounds, lawns, in parlours, kitchens, in prisons and even on board ships he conducted meetings. One of his favourite sayings was "One of the greatest things in Christian work is the abolition of bigotry with all faiths working together for the good of all." Dr. Bates always adhered to this. One of his Bible Classes was formed entirely of Chinese students and while pastor of the Broomfield Street M. E. Church he conducted a Sunday School class for the benefit of the Chinese. Dr. Bates came of a patriotic family his ancestors bequeathed to the City of Boston a

cow pasture that is now known as Boston Common. His son the Hon. John L. Bates for two years Governor of Massachusetts, is a tribute to Dr. Bates advocacy for young men to seek the high opinion of his fellow men. On the day of the funeral services were closed along the route of the procession, hundreds of people all classes and creeds gathered around the church unable to gain admittance, and silently wept as the body of the man they loved and revered was carried to its last resting place. Mr. Thornton felt deeply and keenly the loss of the devoted pastor whom he had associated with for years, and tears stood in his eyes as he talked to a correspondent recently, and said how keenly the loss would come home to him when he visited the Methodist Episcopal Church on return.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Memorize vs 13-14  
Close of Paul's third Missionary Journey, Acts 21-17.

Text, acts 21-14. The will of the Lord be done.

#### OVER THE HARD PLACES.

The lesson gives an account of Paul's last journey to Jerusalem, the warning he received by the way, and the arrival at the Holy City.

1. We; Paul and his party. They were at Miletus, and had just said farewell to the elders of the Ephesian church.

Gotten from them; torn from them, for so the words mean, showing how hard these Christians found it to part with Paul, knowing they would never see him again. Come, etc. See A Minute with the Map, as also for the other places touched.

2. Discovered; sighted. Cyprus an island. (See Map.) 4 Disciples; Christians. Tarry; remained. Seven days; while the ship was unloading. Through the Spirit. God's Spirit had made known to them the dangers awaiting Paul in Jerusalem.

5. Accomplished those days; finished that seven days' visit brought us on our way; accompanied them to the sea shore. Kneeling down; to pray with and for one another.

8. Caesarea. See A Minute with the Map. Saluted the brethren; greeted the Christians of that place.

8. Caesarea. See A Minute with the Map; Philip; he who first preached the gospel in the region round Caesarea taught the Ethiopian eunuch (See Acts, ch. 8: 40). Evangelist; one who tells good tidings. The seven; deacons chosen to serve in the church in Jerusalem (see Acts 6: 1-6). 9. Prophecy; reveal the mind of God—in this case regarding the future.

10. Tarry; remained. Come down from Judea; from the province where Jerusalem is situated. The news of Paul's arrival had reached that distance.

11. Girdle; belt of leather, linen or other material worn about the waist by all men of that time. Bound his own hands and feet; to make his prophecy more striking. God revealed to Paul his danger again and again not to stop him, but to test his courage.

15. Carriage; baggage. 16. Old disciple; one who had been Christian some years. Lodge; live. Jerusalem; at that time, the central place of the Christian church, as the Jewish religion. Bre-arrival three; the Christians at Jerusalem. Gladly; with great joy seeing the wonderful apostle again.

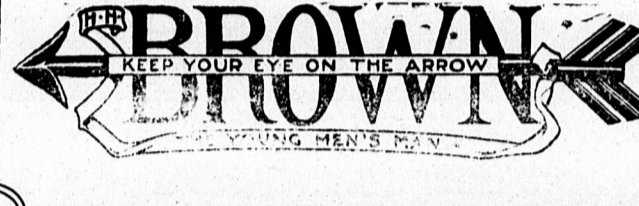

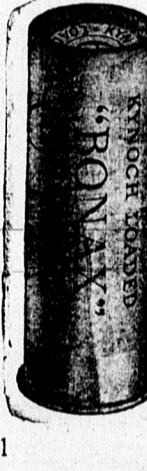
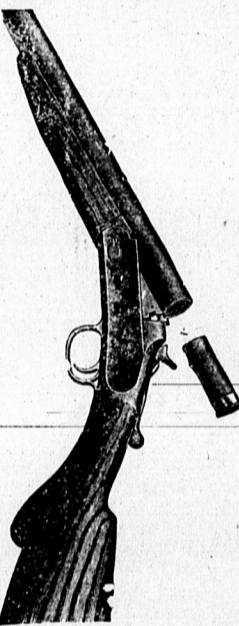
