BILLY SUNDAY NO CHRISTIAN SAYS JEWISH RABBI

NEW YORK, April 4.—Rabbi Stephen S. Wise in Carnegie Hall at the service of the Free Synagogue yesterday morning had for his subject "Billy Sundayism—Disease or Cure?" Figuratively he took a large stout ball and, as that evangelist himself might describe it, "bounced it off Billy Sunday's head."

He said that Billy Sundayism was all disease and offered no cure for the "spiritual problems of mankind." The rabbi classified Billy Sunday as the "greatest theological strike-striker in history," and said there were at least 100 Christian ministers in New York who would lose their jobs if they dared preach what they think of Billy Sunday.

"I don't believe what Billy Sunday teaches, and I am not certain that he believes it himself. Billy Sundayism is something deeper than the man is or knows or apprehends. It is grave and imperilling. It reveals a social disorder, a moral feature and a religious bankruptcy of our time. It is only an incident. In one word it means that the church may be in danger, on the verge of failure and doomed to extinction. Billy Sundayism will go when religion comes to life again and takes the place of a possible perishable church. Billy Sundayism is possible because of theological standpointism and intellectual moribundness."

Rabbi Wise quoted Billy Sunday as having said: "If a minister believes and teaches evolution he is a striking skunk and he is a hypocrite and a liar" and then added, "ministers in New York who believe in evolution will be terrorized by this new and cheap vitriol-infestation."

"I have been informed that Sunday is an admirable and adorable man, but I am disturbed about Billy Sundayism. I am disturbed because of the intellectual blight that has fallen on communities he has visited. There was a certain young rabbi in town in Pennsylvania who had preached against Billy Sunday during a revival in the same place. Because of a misunderstanding of what the young rabbi really meant he was asked to resign, and compelled to leave his synagogue because the followers of Billy Sunday went to the members of the young rabbi's synagogue who were shop keepers, and threatened a boycott against them if they did not get rid of the young rabbi. The nominal charges against the young rabbi were that he had preached an irreligious sermon."
