Ottawa Youth Is Winner

BISLEY CAMP, England, July 13.—The triumph of 20 year old Lieut. S. H. MacGregor of Ottawa, in the 10-shot-off today for the Times silver trophy aroused more admiration than anything of the sort in Bisley's history.

The issue was between MacGregor and Sergt. A. G. Fulton of the Queen's Westminster winner of the King's prize in 1912 and last year and considered the best service rifle shot in the Empire.

MacGregor and Fulton carried on a duel, shot for shot, until both had scored 17, consecutive bull's eyes. This was at the 200 range.

Hamilton Cadet Astounds Bisley

(Canadian Press) BISELY CAMP, July 13.—Young Alexander Hilson, member of the team of cadets from Hamilton, Ont., astounded Bisley today by scoring 104 out of a possible 105 in the first stage of the great King's prize, in which more than a thousand marksmen from all parts of the empire competed.

Hilson is to shoot off with six others for the bronze medal and badge of highest scorer. Like the other cadets, he is not eligible for the King's prize itself, which is only for past or present members of His Majesty's forces.

But the cadets are shooting for the medals in each at least twelve Canadians qualified stage. Of Canada's regular Bisley for the second stage of the classic team, 10 members qualified for the King's prize on Friday by shooting second stage and five more still 98 or more in the first stage today.

JONES AGAIN LEADS GOLFERS

(Canadian Press) ST. ANDREW'S, Scotland, July 13.—Robert T. Jones, amateur golfer of Atlanta, Ga., more familiarly known as Bobby Jones will commence the second eighteen holes of 72 hole title round, with a lead of three strokes over his nearest rival in defense of the British open golf championship.

Bobby's putter worked like a magic wand on the first round today and he leaped out ahead of the field of 108 players with a card of 68 which equalled the record for the classic course made by George Duncan, British professional, who failed to qualify for the current championship.

Trailing Jones by three strokes was Len Nettieford, the young Australian amateur champion a left handed hitter, who clubbed his way into an impressive 71 to take the runner-up position at the end of the first eighteen holes play. Only 25 of the players were able to compile scores of 75 or better.

All of the players who competed today will play another eighteen holes tomorrow. If they fail to complete within fifteen strokes of the leader they will be eliminated from competition in the final 36 holes on Friday.

(BOSTON, July 13.—Eva Morrison long distance mermaid from Pictou, N. WILLS KNOCKED OUT BY UZCUDUN

(Canadian Press) BROOKLYN, July 13.—Paolino Uzcudun, the bounding basque of the Pyrenees knocked out Harry Wills New Orleans negro in the fourth round of their scheduled ten round bout here tonight.

Wills was warned against hitting in the break in the first round. The giant negro was trying up his opponent at close quarters and landing short choppy hooks to head and body. The referee had trouble separating the fighters from a clinch in the second round, following which Paolino curled his left to the negro's ear.

BISLEY CAMP, Eng., July 13.—Corporal E. G. Stock of Toronto, recorded 69 out of a possible 70 in the qualifying stage for the St. George's Challenge Vase, one of the two features service rifle events at Bisley today. Corporal Stock had 34 out of 35 at the first distance, 7 shots at 200 yards and had a possible 35 at the second distance 7 shots at 600 yards.

Lieutenant Desmond Burke of Ottawa, and Sergeant B. W. Beaumont of Vancouver, followed Stock with aggregates of 68. The best hundred scorers in the shoot go into the second stage on Saturday.
