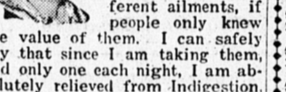

Charlottetown, P. E. I.—Receipts light, market firm, demand good, paying country points extras 58, firsts 50, seconds 40.
MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 15.—Montreal exporters today reported a good demand for Manitoba wheat and Canadian western oats and considerable business was transacted. On the whole the market was rather more active. Engagements of 15 to 20 loads of ocean grain freight were made from West St. John and Portland for January loading at steady rates. Owing to the above there was an improved demand from United States and Canadian exporters for Manitoba wheat in the domestic market and sales of 25,000 bushels of No. 1 northern wheat made at 10 1/2 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg May option, c.i.f. Buffalo, and a round lot of No. 2 northern was sold at a c.i.f. price bay ports. There was also a better demand for coarse grains and moderate trade was done. The tone of the market was firm with sales of car lots of Ontario and Quebec No. 2 white being made at 53 cents, No. 3 white at 51 1/2 cents and No. 4 white at 50 cents per bushel. Canadian western grades were steady. While a stronger tone prevailed in the spring and winter wheat flour markets prices failed to show any change. The trade volume in both cases was fair.
A feature of the millfeed trade was the stronger feeling that developed in the market and millers in some cases advanced prices \$1.00 per ton for all lines, while others reported the undertone very firm and made no change in values. The demand was fair. The undertone of the market for standard grades of rolled oats was firm and the volume of business was moderate. The market for fresh eggs was firmer and prices were advanced one to three cents per dozen. Storage grades were unchanged. The butter and cheese markets continued quiet and firm.

THE MARKETS
(Canadian Press.)
OTTAWA, Dec. 15.—The production of eggs is on the increase and the market is inclined to be easier. Receipts of poultry are much heavier. There is keen competition among buyers, more particularly for turkeys on account of the near approach of the Christmas holidays.
Toronto egg prices are unchanged. Receipts of fresh eggs are increasing but are not sufficient yet to materially effect prices. The poultry market is firm.
MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 15.—Prices are being well maintained for all grades of eggs under a steady demand for supplies for immediate consumption.
Saskatchewan.—Very few fresh eggs are arriving. The movement of turkeys and poultry throughout Saskatchewan is heavy and the quality of the birds generally is good.
Calgary, Alta.—Jobbing fresh eggs \$18.00 per case, firsts \$14.50 per case, storage extras \$12.90 per case, firsts \$12.00 per case and second.
