### NECESSITY OF MUTUAL ASSISTANCE.

Sermon by Rabbi Kaufman Kohler of New York.

TAKEN FROM ISAIAH XLI:6.

"They Helped Every One His Neighbor and Every One Said to His Neighbor Be of Good Cheer."

They helped every one his neighbor; and every one said to his brother, Be of good courage.—Isaiah, xli, 6.

The favorite word of our age is power. We no longer dread the forces of nature; we have learned to subjugate the fiery steeds and hitch them to our chariot, to carry us triumphantly with lightning speed across earth and sea to do our bidding; we have turned the rays of the sun and all the things hidden in the soil into sources of human power, and we rate men and nations, the trades and the sciences, even knowledge and character, by the power they wield.

But there is something crude and selfish in that universal strife and struggle for power. For where there is victory on one side there is defeat on the other. Every success here implies failure there. Power can be no end to itself; it may be used well or misused; it may become the means of uplifting or of crushing others. Power is a trust. It emanates from a higher Power, which is benign and just. It is given to God's children for help, not for harm; it must, in order to be a gift of heaven, prove a source of strength for the feeble. It must not overawe and overwhelm, but protect and shield the powerless.

The greatness of our age consists not in the powerful machinery we have invented, in the mighty steam and electric forces which proclaim man's dominion over nature, nor in the great organizations of labor and capital that make the achievements of marvellous enterprises possible, nor even in those intellectual forces, such as science, literature and the press, which interlink the lands and the nations and unify the world. The deep spiritual current underlying and overruling all movements and aims of our century, "the still, small voice" heard in the recesses of all hearts today, is the word "responsibility." Every human woe that comes to our notice, every condition of wretchedness that we encounter, the fierce social struggles and the exasperating labor strikes which we watch with abated breath hold before our minds with even greater impressiveness the lesson of responsibility.

True, in everyday experience we are inclined to regard power as the means of controlling life for selfish purposes and each privilege as the opportunity of personal enjoyment and ease. The man who stands at the top of the social ladder is, as a rule, regarded by those beneath him as one who has great resources of pleasure and mighty advantages for personal aggrandizement open to him, and therefore made an object of envy and jealousy; if not of malice and hatred. Nor can it be denied that the great majority of men are so prompted by selfish aims and motives as to be ever eager to abuse power and privilege by indulgence in passion and greed. On the other hand, the less fortunate, no less guided by narrow, selfish feelings, behold in this inequality of life the favoritism of Providence and rebel against this cruelty of fate. This is an altogether erroneous view. There are no favors in God's world but involve also greater obligations. Each privilege we enjoy means another duty. Every power we obtain imposes upon us some new responsibility. There is no such thing as equality in life. Nature did not fashion all flowers and trees alike. Its beauty consists in its variety of form and color, in its contrasts of high and low, of strong and feeble. Neither are all men moulded alike, physically or intellectually; otherwise human existence would be bereft of all charm, of all ambition.

There is only one way of countenancing the contrasts of life. "Let not the wise glory in his wisdom, neither let the mighty glory in his might, nor let the rich glory in his riches; but let him that glories glory in this, that he understandeth and knoweth me, that I am the Lord who exercise loving kindness, judgment and righteousness in the earth; for in these things I delight, saith the Lord" (Jer. ix., 23, 24). Every distinction in rank and power must mean higher tasks, greater responsibilities; every privilege granted must rouse a keener sense of duty and assert a greater claim of helpful love and protection for the less privileged. Mutual aid is the magic spell of happiness; it is the watchword, the message of the age. Life is assuming a new meaning for us. The upper classes dare no longer idle away their time in mere pleasure-seeking, shutting their eyes to the misery and woe of those huddled together in filthy quarters, and saying, with Cain, "Am I the keeper of my brother?" They are learning the lesson of responsibility. They can no longer in false conceit hold aloof from the child of the gutter, whose ignorance and shame are sure to become a source of peril to them.

Responsibility has become the rallying cry of the better classes throughout our land, throughout the world. The wide gulf yawning between the high and the humble, between the enlightened and the ignorant, everywhere clamors for heroic actions to counteract the physical

and moral corruption exhaling its deadly poison upon the poverty-stricken and threatening the safety and the purity of every home and every life. Our churches and synagogues are more and more turning religion from a policy of life insurance for the world to come into a system of mutual responsibility for the life, the salvation, the joy and the happiness and purity of all. Charity and education are becoming ever broader, truly philanthropic, ever eager to study and to supply the needs of all, and even when dealing with crime we are less ready to condemn, but investigate the conditions that caused it and share in the blame cast upon society, of which we are members as well as transgressors.

And this principle of responsibility is at work also in bringing labor and capital ever closer together. Linked together by mutual interests, they cannot fail to make that higher union their aim which seeks the peace and welfare of all classes alike, of every home in the land, every soul as child of God. Unions or corporations that crush individual skill and enterprise are tyrannical powers void of soul, void of love. Let responsibility for all and each become the leading principle, and power becomes a tower of strength, a protection.

#### THE DOMINION PACKING COMPANY.

SIR.—When the coming of a promoter of the Dominion Packing Co. with unlimited capital, was heralded by our papers public expectation was naturally high. A representative of that Company in the person of a Mr. Wiley, a very suggestive name, suddenly appeared on the Island proposing to expend a large amount in buildings, wages, etc. Prices of packing supplies were to be high, as the profits of the Company arose, chiefly from the largeness of the business, and the extraordinary economy of management, as nothing was to be lost. At that time, it was not known who were the members of the Company. But since, the names of some of them have been given to the public. It seems that there are some who in the late Dr. Gray would call buckram men in the dim distance, whose names it is not prudent to mention just now. But to gratify our pride, and save us from being surprised by such an inflow of unearned wealth, the Company has consented to accept such trading recompense as we can afford to give. For instance, we will be allowed to pay a sum equal to the interest on price of Pork Factory, thus giving its use free. It seems to be an open question, whether our Government may not be allowed, in addition to a tax on their official signature to Company's bonds to amount of \$150,000. The City too is expected to contribute its mite by exemption from taxation for twenty years.

The whole transaction reminds me of a story told by my mother. A pedlar in Scotland came to the house of a lady to sell his wares. She happened to be absent just then. The pedlar opened a row of cheese on a shelf, and put one in his pack. On her return he was seized with a fit of generosity, and asked if she and her family were fond of cheese. She said cheese was a favorite diet both with herself and all her family. He helped them all liberally and gained great credit for generosity, besides getting away with the remains of the cheese. With reference to canning and cold storage: Does any person think that the Company proposed to run a cold storage department for the sole benefit of the Island, without regard to profit? Something has been said about limiting the charges for cold storage to the rates in other parts of the Dominion. But what if cold storage in other parts is owned by some Company? Those who are overcharged, would at best appeal from a Judge Drunk to Judge Sobber.

I was surprised to hear good business men say that there is nothing to prevent other companies from doing business on the Island. Surely such have not read the history of the Standard Oil Co. That history would show the stealthy tread of artful promoters who by special railway rates and other dishonest means to lessen the profits of other companies, and compel them to sell to themselves, often at fifty per cent less than value.

In his speech at the meeting of the Board of Trade Mr. Peters refers to a contract. If the consideration on the part of the Company in return for a guarantee or bonus, is that the Company expend \$20,000 first year, and \$10,000 yearly afterwards, it has suspicion on the face of it, what sane Company would spend that amount on new buildings when the present factory is much more than equal to the wants of the Island? What estimate do they place on the intelligence of our Government and people when they ask us to believe that by the flat of the Company they can create a supply of animals, vegetables and fruits, the manufacturing of which will cause them to expend \$10,000, neither more or less? We know that those large Companies were powerful, especially in plundering the property of others. But we were not aware, that they can say, "let there be hogs, and there were hogs." Lately we had a sample of their peculiar methods of encouraging farmers to raise more pigs. Just when the bulk of the pork was ready for sale they seemed to stop buying and thus reduce the price. It is said that more than four or five thousand dollars from the farmers. How much of that was saved to the Company through their agents can only be guessed. I can easily understand how our Government was trapped into a scheme sprang suddenly on them. Especially when the Opposition press charged them with neglect of duty in not accepting so good an offer.

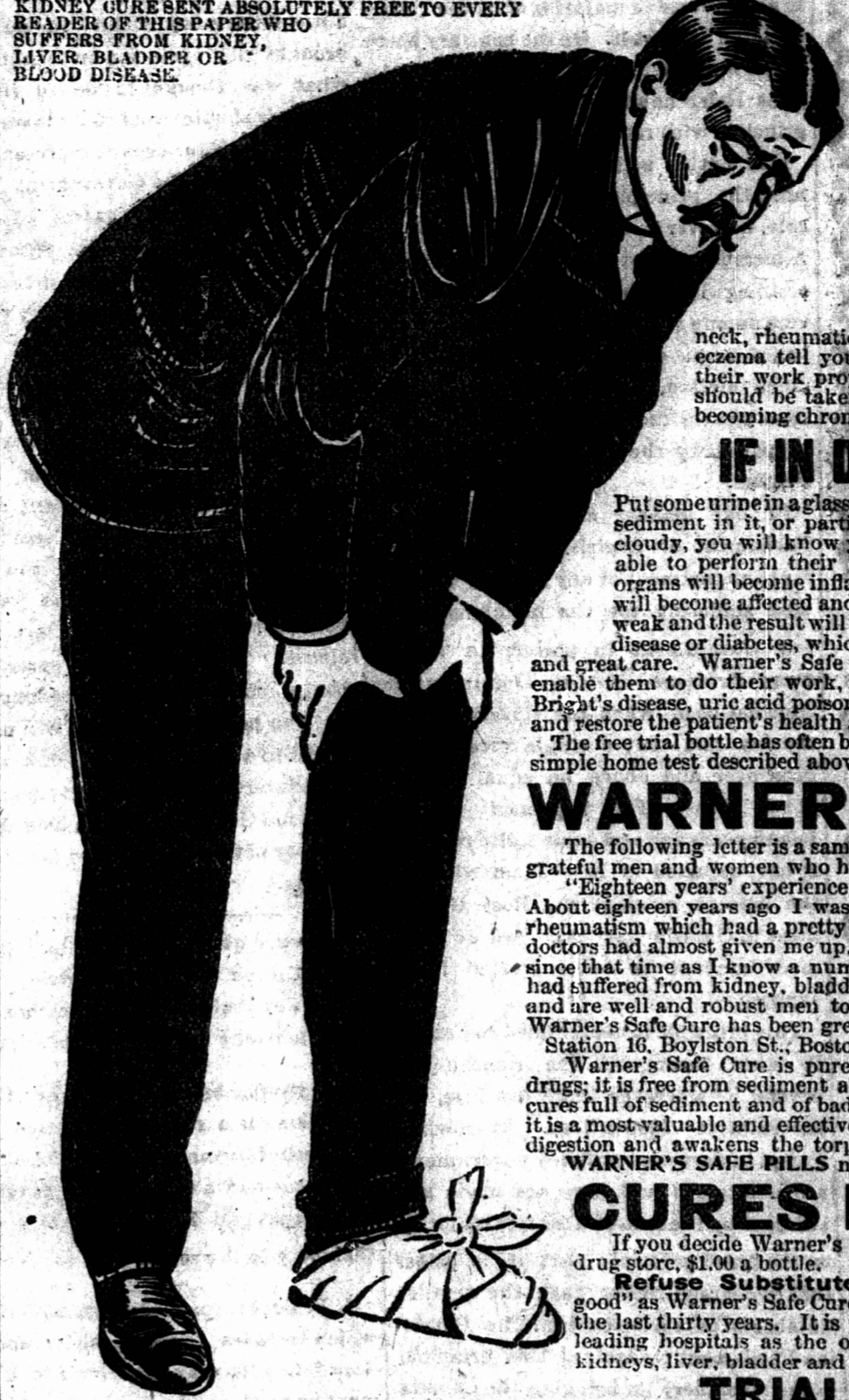
