## FISH AND GAME ASSOCIATION

The Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Protection Association lately organized in the city is assuming proportions greatly in advance of the fondest hopes of the most sanguine of its promoters and from present appearances is destined to become a power in the land. It is being received throughout the entire Province with much more favor than ever shown to any other society and association organized in the Island, and it will doubtless receive even a better welcome and a largely increased support when its object and motives are more generally known and understood.

The Association is already drawing up a petition to the Federal Government calling attention to the fact that too many of the people living in the country are too busy with their crops and farm work during the present open season to spare time to fish trout and praying the Government to change the laws so that the open season will commence two months earlier and permit fishing through the ice. There is no good reason why this request should not be granted as trout, at the date named, are in good condition for food and fishing with hook and line through the ice would never deplete the streams.

Thus the first act of the Association is not to benefit city sportsmen, as its promoters affirm but to enable a great number of people living in the country to lawfully catch fish at the only time of the year in which they can spare the time to enjoy the pastime.

The object of the Association is not to deprive anyone of the right to fish and shoot but to replenish the stream and forest that there will be an abundance of fish and game, and to have the laws amended and rigidly enforced so that everyone, be he hunter or angler, expert or tyro may have a fair chance of a good days sport.
