Influenza Epidemic Public Notice

Owing to the present epidemic of influenza the attention of persons concerned is called to the necessity of having every place of worship, school, hall or other meeting place throughout this Province, thoroughly washed and cleaned and ventilated by the opening of windows and doors before again permitting the public to use the same.

Boards of Health are required to see that this order is strictly complied with. By order of the Provincial Board of Health. W. J. McMILLAN, Provincial Health Officer 21st Oct. 1918.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations. THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of land in the Northwest Territories, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Fee by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not at a sub-agency.

PROTECTION FOR FOXES NEEDED

The outbreak of influenza among our people has of course overshadowed the outbreak of the disease in the fox ranches of this province, but the latter should not be lost sight of. It will be remembered that an expert was here from Ottawa who made investigations and conducted microscopic examinations. Premier Arsenault, on behalf of the Government, promised the fox men to do everything in his power towards preventing the spread of the disease and he asked Dr. Torrance, the Dominion Veterinary General to allow the expert to remain longer in this province, but the Doctor had replied that it was advisable to have him at Ottawa where the facilities for conducting research were on hand.

Since the expert left here, several foxes have died and these have been forwarded to Ottawa. Although for the present little is being heard about the disease which has struck the ranches, there is no telling when there may be another outbreak and "preparedness" should be the great motto.

The industry is valued in the millions and as about \$50,000 in taxes have been collected by the Government, it follows that the Government should view the situation seriously and appoint some one who will be in a position to deal with the disease among foxes.

It must be remembered that there are millions of dollars invested and every shareholder, both large and small is anxious that they shall receive returns for their money, if not from live animals from the sale of pelts.

Of course if a disease should sweep through the ranches and destroy the foxes, then all hope of getting returns for the money will speedily vanish.

It might be pointed out that while every provision is made by the Government to handle diseases in domestic animals, horses, cattle, sheep, hogs, etc., the foxes are not in such a happy position. As one rancher puts it—"if a fox gets sick now all I can do is to dose him with castor oil and trust to luck."

The Premier has expressed his desire to help out the fox men and it is up to the latter to see that the Premier is kept informed of the exact condition of affairs.

During a meeting of the caretakers held this autumn, it was brought out for instance, that the Dominion Veterinary in this city, had no power to quarantine fox ranches unless for certain diseases. No time should be lost in placing the fox industry on the same basis as that of our other domestic animals, so far as sanitary regulations are concerned. It is too valuable an industry to trifle with.

Since the above was written we learn that the following telegram was received by Mr. E. R. Brow, President of the Fox Breeders' Association: New York.

American Breeders' Association has issued a circular saying that an epidemic has broken out among Island foxes, that Washington has placed a temporary embargo on importations to the States. This is serious. Suggest your association petition through Ottawa to remove embargo before made permanent. Advise me fully what it is, and what section is affected and the losses. Can help. Wire. Black Fox Magazine.

The following reply was sent: Charlottetown, Oct. 26. Fox Breeders' Association have taken matter up at Washington. No contagious or infectious disease among foxes here.

It is pleasing to learn, according to these gentlemen, that there is at present no infectious disease among our foxes, but the great question is: Why should not there be a competent specialist in fox diseases appointed for this province, who can deal effectively with any outbreak, and prevent its spreading?

To be forewarned is to be forearmed.
