THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST

Latest from Summerside and Prince County.

THE thermometer registered five below zero at the Summerside Meteorological Station Saturday morning.

Miss PENE WHIDDEN, North Redouque spent last week visiting in Summerside, the guest of Mrs. S. M. Hicks.

Mrs. J. M. SULLIVAN was a passenger by the Stanley on Saturday on a visit to her parents, W. S. and Mrs. G. ex., Summerside.

Dr. John F. McNeill, has opened an office in the residence of John Muirhead of Church Street, corner of Central. The doctor has also made this his place of residence boarding at Mr. Muirhead's, and may be found there day or night.

THE Stanley returned to Summerside on Saturday at 11.20 o'clock, having left Cape Armentine at 7.40, bringing 23 passengers, one car sugar, one car mixed freight and 176 bags mail, including Friday evening's mail. The officers of the boat report the Strait full of ice. The train from the west due to leave here at 11 a. m. was held until the Stanley arrived and left at 11.59 with the passengers and mail. A special train took the passengers and mails to Charlottetown. On the trip to Cape Tormentine on Friday the steamer had 22 passengers, 250 bags of oats, 120 dressed hogs and sundries.

His Mother Knew He Was Out.

The Duke of Leeds, who has just celebrated his fortieth birthday, will probably be remembered as the youthful candidate for Parliament, who, when asked by a scoffer at one of his meetings whether his mother knew he was out, retorted, "Yes, and at 10 o'clock on the polling day she will know I'm in." He was in, sure enough, and for eight years, as Marquis of Carmarthen, sat in the House of Commons as member for Brixton. The Duke's connection with the city dates back to the sixteenth century, when one of his ancestors, following the custom of the time, married the daughter of the merchant to whom he was apprenticed, and afterwards became Lord Mayor. This was Sir Edward Osborne, who occupied the Mansion House in 1582.

Abandon the Saloon.

The way to prevent a complete extermination of the liquor traffic through prohibitory legislation is to abandon the saloon. This is the striking conclusion reached by Bonfort's Wine and Spirit Circular (New York), in a recent review of the trade situation. It says:—"The average saloon is out of line with public sentiment. The average saloon ought not to be defended by our trade, but it ought to be condemned. In small towns the average saloon is a nuisance. It is a resort for all tough characters, and in the south for all idle negroes. It is generally on a prominent street, and it is usually run by a sport who cares only for the almighty dollar. From this resort the drunken man starts reeling to his home; at this resort the local fights are indulged in. It is a stench in the nostrils of society and a disgrace to the wine and spirit trade. How, then, shall we defend the average saloon? We answer, Don't defend it, but condemn it. We must stand abreast of the most advanced public sentiment; we must oppose prohibition, but favor only decent trade; we must offer society a substitute for the average saloon; we must ask society to join with us in securing model license laws; we must demand character qualifications, and get men in the retail liquor business who will conduct their places as drug stores, for instance, are conducted. We must help to clean the Augean stables; we must lift the business out of the rut into which it has run for so long a time; we must prove that we are the friends of law, order, decency, temperance."

If it is found and captured there will be an exciting time, not only for the hunters, but for naturalists throughout the world. It is the largest bird that ever existed.
