TRAIN LATE - The train from Borden over an hour late reaching the city last night, carrying passengers and mail. The delay was due to mainline connections.

SCHOOL MEETINGS - The annual school meetings were held throughout the rural districts of the province last night. These meetings are considered of great importance and the appointment of a new trustee is the main matter of business. Sometimes the teacher for the coming year is named but most often this is left to a later date.

CHECKING VISION AND HEARING - Mr. A. Stronach, Moncton, Standard Rule Instructor and Examiner for the Canadian National Railways in the Atlantic Region, arrived with his special railway car in Charlottetown last evening. He is in the province at present examining all train and engine employees for vision and hearing. He has visited Summerside and will also go to Murray Harbour before returning to the mainland. The car visits here every two years.

HOTTEST DAY IN JUNE - The hottest day so far this summer was June 22 when the temperature soared 98 degrees. Mr. Warren, Provincial Observer at the Experimental Farm said last night. Yesterday's rainfall, the first in July, was only slightly over a tenth of an inch. The mean temperature in June this year was slightly below that of 1940, while the rainfall was almost double that of last year. The province was, however, favored with more sunshine compared to 1938 last year.

NAVY MANOEUVRES - Residents of Kepnock need not fear any hostile invasion if they notice any action in that vicinity today. These manoeuvres belong to the lot of the Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve and are conducting manoeuvres in the area. They commenced yesterday evening and will continue today and part of tomorrow. There will be two teams - one the defenders and the other the attackers. Residents need not be alarmed if they hear rifle shots as these would only be blank shots.

DAYLIGHT BURGLARIES - Citizens, especially those going out during the afternoons, are warned by Chief Inspector H. H. Smith to see that their doors are locked before they leave the premises because a series of petty thefts have been reported during the past few days. These thefts have occurred in the afternoon when the householders were up town. In almost all cases they failed to secure the doors before leaving. Brighton area has suffered most from these daylight burglaries. Yesterday \$9 was stolen from a house on Park Terrace while another house nearby was also looted. Three dollars were taken from another house within the past few days. Chief Inspector H. H. Smith is of the opinion that the thefts are of the kind of someone who goes from door to door and finding them unfastened, enters.

INTERESTED IN GAME HERE - Mr. Fred A. Tyler, New York, well-known sportsman of United States was in the city yesterday and plans to spend a few days in the province. He is interested in Hungarian partridges and is here checking on the number of these birds with the view of interesting hunters of United States in the possibilities of coming here on shooting expeditions. At present many of the United States sportsmen journey as far as Saskatchewan to bag the Huns. Mr. Tyler is also interested in trout fishing and plans to do a bit of fishing while here. He has written many stories on outdoor life. Mr. Tyler is a personal representative of Mr. W. P. Conway, President of the Guarantee Trust Company in New York. He is accompanied by his son, Mr. B. Graham Rogers, Supervisor of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau has arranged various fishing trips for him and also has made arrangements with Const. Spurgeon Jenkins, Game Warden, to show him to the different haunts of the Hungarian Partridge.
