A BIT OF HISTORY.—Franklin K. Lane, minister of the interior in President Woodrow Wilson's cabinet, is a figure of much interest in the maritime provinces. A Nova Scotia correspondent sends from Westville some interesting particulars regarding Mr. Lane. His grandfather, on the mother's side (Michael Burns) lived in New Glasgow many years ago when that place was only a small village. When the family moved from there, some settled in the western part of Nova Scotia and others went to the United States. Carrie, one of the daughters married Dr. Lane, who lived in Truro. They afterwards resided in DeSable, Prince Edward Island for a time, and it was there that Franklin K. Lane was born. They afterwards went to California. The older residents of New Glasgow speak very well of the Burns family. The father was a potter, and Peter's Bridge, on the East River Road, where they lived, was named after him. The explanation why the people in Westville and that vicinity feel more than passing interest in the Hon. Franklin K. Lane.—St. John Exchange.

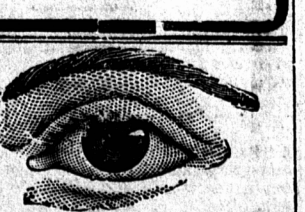
