Description of Ranch

The chief point of interest for the thousands of tourists who visit Charlottetown is the Dennis farm. It is situated about ten minutes' drive from the city on an eminence overlooking the harbor and consists of one hundred and sixty acres of land. It is chiefly of interest because the fox ranch which occupies ten acres of woodland on the highest point of this farm is the largest in the Province and its owner has the reputation of being the most successful of fox breeders up to the present time.

Situated as it is on a wooded hilltop it is ideally located for a fox home. The natural drainage of the ground is perfect, so that there is no danger of spring freshets so fatal to young foxes. The air is always pure and fresh, for the winds which sweep the hilltop carry away all harmful and disagreeable odors and tumble the chilling fogs into the valley below. The fact that Mr. Dennis has never had a single case of sickness among his animals since he acquired the present ranch (three years ago) is sufficient evidence of the healthfulness of the ranch and surroundings. The ranch has an enviable history of success. Last year seven per cent of the Island's increase of young foxes were born in this ranch. This year Mr. Dennis has raised fifty-eight young foxes. It is not much wonder that he is called the "Wizard Rancher."

Description of Foxes

DINNIS PEDIGREED FOXES are regarded as the type, "par excellence" of silver black fox. They are characterized by thin mobile ears; a full neck, short and arched from the back; width over shoulders and through the heart; a long, delicately turned head; a springy pelt, and pink skin covered with a wealth of fine lustrous fur, particularly marked on limbs and under body; and a large heavy "brush". These are the Hall marks of health and vigour.

The foundation stock of the DINNIS PEDIGREED FOXES was selected from the pens of the Pioneer Ranchmen, Charles Dalton and R. T. Cullen, Alberton, and from the famous Rayner Ranch, Alberton, Prince Edward Island. THE FLOWER SHOW.—That the Prince Edward Island Floral Association is succeeding in its laudable work has been strongly manifested by the second annual Flower Show, which came to a conclusion last night. On both evenings the attendance was gratifyingly large, evidencing a growing love of flowers and appreciation of their beauty and usefulness. The keen interest and appreciative comment of the spectators must have been most encouraging to those who worked so painstakingly to promote the Show—they can rest assured of the pleasure they gave, and this is no small reward. It would be invidious to make special mention of any particular exhibit; it is most pleasant to be able to state that the flowers shown were rarely beautiful specimens of their different kinds—indeed many visitors to the city, who dwell in more temperate climes were surprised at the excellence of the exhibits and the perfection of form and color in this climate. The show, however, only confirmed the assertion which many flower-lovers in this Province main-

tain, namely, that our climate is a perfect one for the growing of hardy annuals and perennials and flowering shrubs, while a little extra care will reward abundantly all who try their luck with the less hardy varieties. Many flower lovers who were interested in the show were surprised at the variety of the entries—but it may be said that with but a few exceptions all the types shown were the result of cultivation in the open ground. Cosmos, sweet peas, snap-

dragon, dianthus, cornflowers, nasturtiums, pansies, poppies, calliopsis, stocks, larkspurs, and all the old "grandmother's flowers" were there, recalling childhood associations, and appealing by their beauty to the finer feelings of the visitors. The dahlias were a revelation,—they too, are within the compass of the amateur gardener who cares to raise them from either seeds or bulbs. An exhibit of water-lilies and one of roses, showed that the more ambi-

tious gardeners were thoroughly successful, and several novelties showed what the Island climate and local skill is capable of producing. One of the most satisfactory features of the affair is the fact that exhibits came from all over the province, showing the universal love of flowers, and indicating that a good and improving work is being carried on by the Floral Association, the members of which are to be felicitated on the satisfactory outcome of their efforts.
