The Dominion Government has forwarded to the British Board of Trade awards for three officers and two of the crew of the SS Durango, in recognition of services to the crew of the schooner James W. of Charlottetown, P. E. Island, stranded in the North Atlantic ocean, Feb. 1904.  
Mrs. ALLAN McQUARRIE, Sarsletown, writes that fifteen years ago her daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Littlefield crossed from Pictou to Charlottetown in the summer steamer on the 21st day of January, a beautiful day and not a speck of ice to be seen between the island and the mainland. Passengers were out on deck viewing the scenery.

She had had a long illness, about seven years; and in all that time, there was not a murmur known to have passed her lips. She was the life of the home; and even when her suffering were greatest, she was the most cheery of them all. She will be very much missed in the home, church and community.

It will be remembered by many friends of the late Charles Coughlan, the actor who used to spend his summers in this Province, that his body was buried at Galveston where he died. In the great tidal wave which shortly afterwards devastated Galveston the coffin was washed away. A recent despatch from Galveston says: "A report reached here last night that the body of the late Charles Coughlan, the English playwright and actor, which has been lost since the great storm of September 18th, 1900, has been found in an out of the way place by hunters. The hunters came across the casket almost buried in the marsh and hidden by weeds. Coughlan died there while on tour playing in 'The Royal Box,' and the casket was placed in a vault pending removal to New York for interment. The casket was swept away by the flood. Search for it was kept up for a year and the actors' club had a standing reward for its recovery for nearly three years.  
The annual congregational meeting of Zion Church was held last evening. The proceedings were opened with devotional exercises by the pastor, Rev. George E. Ross. The reports of the different organizations in connection with the church, namely: the men by their respective president and secretaries, namely: W. F. Huggan Superintendent of the Sabbath School; Mrs. Cairns, Colin McNeill, James D. Lawson, Mrs. S. C. Moore, S. C. Moore secretary and S. A. McDonald chairman. Every report was very satisfactory and showed the different organization of the Church to be in a flourishing condition. After paying all bills, on current account, the trustees are able to report a surplus of \$45.23. This result, all feel assured, will be as gratifying to the congregation as it is to the Board. In May last, the Trustees were empowered to purchase a site for a new Church and Sabbath School, costing \$1,450.00 this site will be completely paid for by May, 1907. The total revenue of the trustees amounted to \$2,585.77; the total expenditure was \$2,540.54, leaving a surplus of \$45.23. The financial report was submitted by Mrs. M. E. Sutherland, treasurer, and audited by W. B. Robertson and Geo. W. McLeod. The total amount from all sources collected during the year was \$5,438.25. The trustees were heartily commended by several of the leading church workers for their work for the past year, and received a hearty vote of thanks from the congregation.
