VLADIVOSTOK TO BE CAPTURED

Before Peace is Discussed—Such is the View of Diplomats Take of Japan's Attitude—Renewal of Russian Loan Negotiations Indicates That Czar has Promised to Seek Peace.

PARIS, March 24.—The prospects of peace between Russia and Japan assumed a more definite and almost a tangible aspect today as the result of the announcement of the resumption of negotiations for a Russian loan. The postponement of the loan occurred through the stand taken by the financial element against proceedings while the uncertainties of war continued, whilst a willingness to resume negotiations was construed as meaning that their strong influence finally has prevailed with the authorities at St. Petersburg. The effect of the first announcement was to stimulate the market and particularly Russian securities. A reaction occurred on fears as to the effect the heavy demands of the loan would have on the market and doubts concerning the ability to which the loan would be put. However, it seems to be the accepted view of financiers that the proceeds of the loan will not be applied to the further continuance of the war.

Coupled with the announcement of resumption of the loan negotiation came a strong intimation from official and diplomatic quarters that steps looking toward peace had been definitely taken by Russia. The foreign office declined to confirm a report that France was likely to be the intermediary, but diplomats, who are actively interested, for the first time gave credit to the statement that Russia had decided to seek peace. Russia's chief preoccupation is said to be avoidance of having peace plans raised to the animosity of the powerful war element at home.

The receipt of an official despatch at St. Petersburg on March 20, saying that the Japanese were approaching Vladivostok, is said to have induced the determination to seek a pacific solution. On the other hand, it is insisted that Japanese proximity to Vladivostok promises to be a chief obstacle in the way of peace, as diplomats conversant with the situation say that Japan will seek to avert peace until she possesses Russia's only outlet to the Pacific Ocean. A brisk action occurred the evening of March 18 Kaiyuan, the Russian rear guard beating off two heavy attacks, which lasted until midnight.

After blowing up railway bridges north of Kaiyuan at five places, the Russian retirement was continued March 19, 20 and 21, with only light rifle firing. The Mukden branch of the Russo-Chinese Bank removed all its money except \$100,000. St. Petersburg, March 25.—The Russian rear guard is now occupying a line of fairly strong positions thirty-four miles south of Gushu Pass, the centre being the railroad village of Sipinghai, and the flanks covering the roads on either side, which, apparently it is the intention to defend long enough to force the Japanese to show their hand. The Russians, however, may have been outflanked and have no intention of making a serious stand, especially as all the correspondents continue to report rumors of wide turning operations on both flanks indicating the probable basis in fact. The correspondents believe a resumption of hostilities on a grand scale and an important battle is improbable inside of three months.

WILL GET SALMON FROM CANADA

To Stock the Rivers and Streams of France—Fish Discovered in the Yonne That Found Their Way from the Atlantic.

NEW YORK, March 25.—The Tribune publishes the following cable from Paris: Enormous quantities of salmon spawn from Canada and the United States are to be imported by the French Fish Commissioners. Twenty thousand dollars has been annually expended in stocking the French rivers with the spawn of salmon and of trout obtained in Scotland and in the United States. The revival of salmon in France seems now an assured fact. It was only last year that the salmon supply was so deficient that eight million pounds of this much-sought-for fish were purchased in Great Britain alone at an average price of fifty cents a pound. To-day there is such a large quantity of native French salmon in the Paris market that the retail price for the best prime cuts is only sixty cents a pound—a price ten per cent. lower than has been known here for a quarter of a century.

SCHWAB CLEARS \$10,000,000.

NEW YORK, March 26.—The Charles M. Schwab has cleared up \$10,000,000 in Wall Street in the last six months, and that half a dozen other men who, like Schwab, have loved Sully in his cotton operations, have made fortunes, only inferior to the big steel man's, in the opinion of Wall Street.

THE CANA-MEXICAN SERVICE.

OTTAWA, March 25.—The Elder Dempster Steamship company have notified the Mexican government that it would be glad to its offer to establish a Canada-Mexican service unless a call at Havana, Cuba, was allowed.

DOUKHOBORS AFTER MONEY.

MONTREAL, March 25.—A delegation of Doukhobors have arrived in Montreal from the Northwest to interview the Russian consul with regard to the payment of money due them from the Russian government. When they left Russia their farms and possessions were confiscated by the government of that country. Claims for the amount of their losses were pressed, with the result that the Russian government agreed to settle with the Doukhobors. The money was recently sent to the Russian consul here and the Doukhobors came to collect it.

TRADING STAMPS AGAIN.

OTTAWA, March 24.—The corridors of the house yesterday were filled with delegates and deputations here from Ontario and Quebec to see the government. One of the strongest delegations is that in support of the trading stamp industry in opposition to the crowd which, a few days ago, wanted trading stamps legislated out of existence. As usual the department of justice will do nothing but mark time.
