## Giants Split Double Bill With Chicubs To Close In On Faltering Pirates

### IN THIS CORNER

"Irish" Leo Kelly, the local youngster who meets Gordon "Kid" McNeill of Halifax in the main event at the Forum Wednesday night is training hard every day and is rapidly rounding into shape.

One cannot help but be impressed by the improvement noted in the youngster after his sojourn in the States. No longer a slow starter, Kelly shows poise and experience inside the hempen cords. His punching is faster and deadlier and his Irish grit and determination carries him over the tough spots whenever he is forced to absorb punishment.

McNeill will be faced Wednesday night by a boy who is aiming high in boxing circles. Leo has youth, determination and courage on his side and all this is well proven by the following clipping taken from an Albany, N. Y., paper on the occasion when Kelly won the Golden Gloves Tournament in that city.

Here is how the United States boxing writer viewed Leo's victory: "Of all the champions crowned before an estimated crowd of 1,200 fans last night, the boy who drew the most attention was Irish Leo Kelly, the open middleweight winner. Kelly was so impressive in winning his championship that he was awarded the Mayor Thacher trophy. The gold medal, donated for the best boy in the finals," was presented to Leo last night by Acting Mayor Lester Herzog.

"Kelly displayed the traditional Irish spirit in overcoming several handicaps to capture his title. First, he went into the finals with a bad cut near his left eye as a result of a previous tournament bout. Second, he was paired with a southpaw, Phil Vinci of Rome, and southpaws are always tough for orthodox fighters. Third, Kelly was floored for nine counts in the first round, but he came back to win in a gruelling bout.

"He tore into Vinci with a vengeance in the second and shot the Rome boy's head back with terrific right hand smashes. At the bell for the second round Vinci was groggy and hanging on but he kept absorbing Kelly's punishment in the third stanza and proved too tough to be kayoed by the Irishman. It was clearly Kelly's fight after the first round."

## Triple Crown At Stake At Belmont Today

(By Orlo Robertson) (Associated Press Sports Writer) (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

NEW YORK, June 4—War Admiral and Pompoon bring their rivalry for the three year old turf crown down to Belmont Park tomorrow for the 69th running of the \$50,000 Belmont Stakes, a mile and a half test of speed and stamina.

Five other colts, three of which trailed the pair in either the Kentucky Derby or Preakness, also have been named for the final event of the American turf's "triple crown." It is the presence, however, of Sam Louchheim's War Admiral and J. H. Louchheim's Pompoon, furnishing the outstanding "natural" of the year, that is expected to draw a crowd of 40,000 and break all recent records for attendance at the beautiful Long Island track.

Although the five have turned in sparkling trials, including a 2:31 4-5 for the Belmont route by E. R. Bradley's Brooklyn, the race figures to be a repetition of the first two events of the "triple crown," in which the Admiral beat the Louchheim ace by two lengths in the Derby and then repeated by the narrow margin of a head in the Preakness three weeks ago.

Bookmakers installed the Admiral 4 to 5 favorite today with prospects the odds would be still shorter when the field parades at about 5:30 p. m. A.D.T.

## Exhibitionist Wins Oaks

EPSOM, Surrey, June 4—Covering the derby course in faster time than did Mid-Day Sun on Wednesday, Sir Victor Sassoon's game filly Exhibitionist, starting at odds of 3 to 1, today added the Oaks to her one thousand guineas victory of a month ago.

The bay daughter of Soario-Lady Weibley—a half-sister of the Derby winner—outclassed a field of 13 and, covering the distance in 2:37 or 3-8 of a second faster than Mid-Day Sun, finished the 1 1/2 miles three lengths ahead of F. W. Dennis' Sweet Content, a 33 to 1 shot. A head farther back, in third place, was Lord Astor's Sculpture, at 20 to 1.

Exhibitionist returned £8,500 (\$47,000) to her owner, and brought new laurels to her jockey, 52 year old Steve Donoghue, who also rode her in the Guineas. It was the first time in 12 years that the same horse had won both the classics reserved to fillies and was Donoghue's second triumph in the Oaks. He has won the Derby six times.

The King and Queen were among the large crowd that watched the Sassoon filly round Tattenham Corner and dash to the front along the straight to win easily. Exhibitionist led over the first half mile, but relinquished the running to Burlington Lass and Sculpture until the final furlongs over the straightaway were reached. Then she moved up strongly, took the lead from Sculpture and won as she pleased.

## Cochrane Will Be Moved To Detroit Sunday

NEW YORK, June 4—Mickey Cochrane, Manager of Detroit Tigers, is to be transferred to a hospital in Detroit either Saturday or Sunday night, his physician, Dr. Robert E. Walsh announced late today.

Cochrane is suffering from a triple skull fracture received when he was "beamed" by Bump Hadley of the Yankees in a Detroit-New York game here 10 days ago.

Dr. Walsh said in his opinion Cochrane should remain here for five or six weeks longer until he is entirely out of danger.

## Frick Lifts Suspension On Dean After Stormy Session

NEW YORK, June 4—(AP)—Yielding finally to Dizzy Dean's stubborn insistence that "I ain't goin' to sign nuthin'," President Ford C. Frick of the National League today declared an armistice in his war with the famous pitcher of St. Louis Cardinals and fixed a three-day limit on his suspension.

Frick lifted the ban he imposed on Wednesday, effective in time to permit Dean to pitch against the Phillies at Philadelphia tomorrow, as the climax of a stormy two-day battle of words, the second in as many days.

The League's youthful Chief Executive had to be satisfied, however, only with the pitcher's verbal denial he made any of the derogatory statements which he had been accused of delivering, for publication in the newspapers.

**Signature Missing**  
Dean's refusal took the final form of a series of questions, propounded by Frick, and laconic answers by the pitcher. A dozen newspapermen, together with Manager Frankie Frisch and Secretary Clarence Lloyd of the St. Louis Club, signed the stenographic report of the proceedings as witnesses, but Dean's autograph—the one thing Frick insisted he must have before releasing Dean to good standing—was conspicuously missing.

Dean replying to five questions "from Frick," (1) denied he said the League's balk interpretation rule was instituted as a slap at him or that he said it constituted persecution; (2) and (3) admitted he was warned about enforcement of the rule, in Brooklyn, a week before the riotous battle with the Giants at St. Louis, May 19, and again prior to that particular game, by Frisch; (4) denied he said at a church dinner in Belleville, Ill., that Frick and Umpire George Barr were the "two biggest crooks in baseball"; and (5) denied the accuracy of the story, so quoting him, as published by the Belleville Daily Advocate.

"Signin' Nuthin'"  
Dean not only carried his main point of "signin' nuthin'" after two days of bitter haggling, but stood his ground otherwise. To offset Frick's telegram from the editor of the Belleville newspaper, backing up the paper's account of what Dean said, Dizzy produced a wire signed by nine men, including the Minister of the Belleville Presbyterian Church, which said: "We deem it our duty to express our opinion that your talk (on May 25) was not detrimental to the best interests of baseball but on the contrary was well received by an enthusiastic gathering."

Dean abruptly walked out at one stage, insisting he was "all washed up" with the business. He soon returned for a final battle of words with the much-harassed Frick but continued to shout defiance and threats, even when the League Executive gave ground and lifted the suspension.

The pitcher, continuing to "pop off," disagreed sharply with Frick's statement the "incident was closed," insisted he would still carry his protest to Commissioner Landis, and talked loudly about taking the case to "the highest court."

TURNBERRY, Ayrshire, June 4—(CP Cable)—Ursula Bridget Newell, internationally-known golfer and England's youngest magistrate, died here today after an attack of tonsillitis. She was 25.

Miss Newell, who was Magistrate at Darley Dale Hall, Derbyshire, was runner-up in 1936 in the British Women's Championship to Pam Barton, who also holds the United States women's title.

The young magistrate was one of the favorites for the 1937 title and her death brought expressions of regret from all over the country.
