a great deal of speaking that doesn't count for much because they don't come near to God. We have so much machinery that we haven't steam to run it all.

The speaker went on to mention the note of victory in the passage God intended that we should all have victory. God doesn't intend that we should go on at a poor dying rate. God has power to help us live a life of victory. Let us have it. There is also "new experience" in the words "new experience" people live in old experience. God wants us to have a new experience every day. Let us not live on the past. Let's renew our covenant and make a fresh start.

"They helped everyone his neighbor" and "be of good courage. Note the order. Helpfulness first then courage and cheer up. Help people so they can take courage and cheer up."

Captain Best held the Catholic faith, while Capt. Best was a Protestant Y. M. C. A. Secretary. Captain Best went away for a few days—a terrible snow storm came, but his new neighbor shovelled away the snow. Then Capt. Best had a chance to do some shovelling for him when a chance came. THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press.)

MONTREAL, April 28.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain on the Montreal market today continued dull and the volume of business transacted was very small. The demand for ocean grain from this port was also of a very limited character, but the tone of the market remains about steady. It is estimated that about thirty-five tramp vessels have been engaged to load full cargoes of grain from Montreal in May, the domestic cash grain market was without any new feature to note, prices for oats being steady and the demand from all sources quiet. The spring and winter wheat flour markets were featureless, the trade volume was fair and prices were firm. Prices for all lines of millfeed were well maintained under a moderate demand, the demand for standard grades of hard red winter wheat was steady, the volume was fair and the undertone was steady. The egg market was quiet and firm. Extreme dullness marked the trade in butter and cheese.

OTTAWA, April 28.—Canadian egg markets are firm today. No quotations from the West have been received on Eastern markets. A Montreal broker reports a sale of turkeys, heavy weights 32, light seconds 27, F O B Vancouver, Toronto dealers paying country shippers extras 32 1/2, firsts 30 1/2, seconds 25 to 25 1/2. Prices to retailers extras 34, firsts 32, seconds 28 to 29, retailers, extras 38, firsts 35, seconds 34. Montreal dealers paying country shippers

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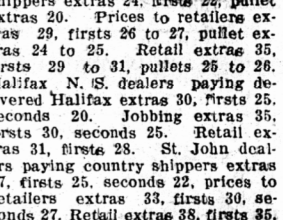
