He is now completely recovered and is going back in order to be at the finish of the world's greatest conflict. He has two brothers at the front.

P. E. ISLAND FOX BREEDERS ASSOCIATION.—The annual meeting of this association was summoned yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade Room. Mr. E. R. Brow, president, presided. As it was considered desirable to have the report of the Fur Sales Board in the hands of members before transacting ordinary business, it was agreed to adjourn the meeting to a date to be fixed by the president. As soon as Mr. McLure returns from the United States, the report of the Fur Board will be prepared for submission to the members. A letter was read from Mr. McLure to the president. His message to the breeders was "Keep patient, we are going to come out all right in the end. We will get good prices for good skins." He stated that he had already turned down offers of \$1,000 each for some of the pelts. He sold one pair for \$1,500 at St. Louis. Between 200 and 300 pelts were sold in all and Mr. McLure has forwarded between \$7,000 and \$8,000 to be distributed among members of the Board. The market has been a little unsettled since the breaking off of diplomatic relations with Germany, but it is steadily again. Mr. McLure said that the impression had gone abroad in New York that he was bringing 500 skins, and this had a tendency to make buyers expect low prices, but once the facts were made known, then the situation improved considerably. After a brief discussion on the need of amalgamating the Fur Sales Board and the Association, also on registration, taxation, etc., the meeting adjourned to be held again at the call of the chair. At the next meeting it is expected that the report of the Fur Sales Board will be available.
