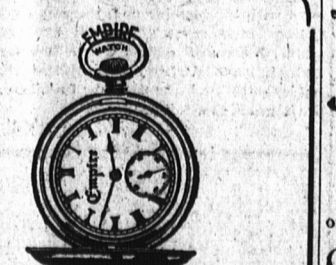
The King's County Temperance Alliance met Thursday afternoon in McKinnon's Hall, Montague. There was a large attendance and much interest was taken in the work. The Alliance has taken a determined stand on the question of suppressing the liquor traffic and has authorized a committee to employ a lawyer whenever necessary to enforce the law properly. Cheering reports were given concerning the petitions which have been in circulation for some time for the repeal of the Scott Act, 830 out of the required 1200 names having been secured. Especially good work was done in this connection by Rev. Ronald B. McDonald of Souris. As it is desirable that all names be in by July 1st, it would be well if all lodges and private individuals who have petitions would secure the names and send them in as early as possible.
