

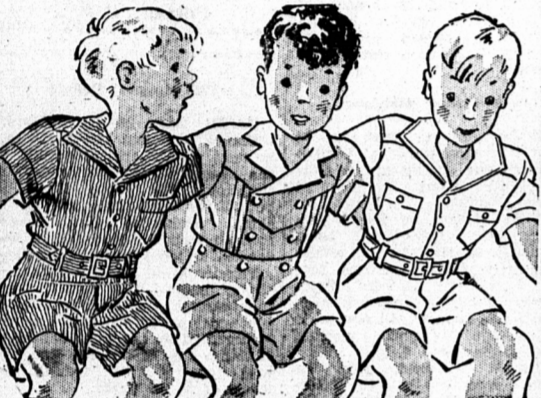

(Acadia), superintendent of Marine in the Department of Marine and Fisheries, and Mrs. Dixon, to Mr. Lloyd Harold Jenkins, only son of Mr. Robert Harold Jenkins, of Calgary, Alta., formerly Mayor of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, and also at one time member of parliament for Queen's Prince Edward Island, and Mrs. Jenkins, took place on Saturday afternoon in Christ Church, Aylmer, Que., which was adorned with gladiolus in pastel shades for the occasion. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. L. F. Crothers, rector of St. James Church, Hull, Que. The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, wore a gown of orchid chiffon made on long graceful lines, the skirt forming short train and finished at the waist with a velvet sash in fuchsia shade. She wore a fuchsia velvet hat, and slippers of the same tone, and a corsage bouquet of orchids and lilies-of-the-valley. She was attended by her sister, Miss Mary Dixon as bridesmaid, wearing pale pink georgette, with a velvet sash of Marina blue, a Marina blue velvet hat, and a corsage bouquet of pink roses. Mr. William Cunroy was best man. Mrs. Dixon, mother of the bride, was wearing a gown of pale grey georgette with a gray hat and corsage bouquet of Tallis-man roses and pansies. COURT LENIENT.—Joseph Shoop was found guilty of robbery, with violence to the person of Joseph McDonald, in the police court yesterday morning, and was sentenced to serve a term of six months in Dorchester jail. P. P. Murphy, clerk of the peace, summed up the case for the prosecution, saying that he knew Magistrate Lane would do what he thought best. But this was a serious offense, Mr. Murphy said. The accused had deliberately, without any provocation, attacked the 77-year-old pensioner and robbed him of \$4.85—a simple case of highway robbery. Shoop was a young man from Prince Edward Island, and he had been drinking at the time of the attack. It was not a question of the amount of goods stolen, but the offense, robbery with violence. Life imprisonment is often given for similar offenses, he said. Shoop should be given a sentence fitting for the offense. Mr. Murphy believed, so that he would not be tempted to commit another such folly. The accused for the prosecution that he was 39 years of age and had been living in Moncton for five years, with only intermittent employment. Shoop had been before the local court 12 times since 1931, the magistrate went on, but he had not been arraigned on a serious charge before. It was the custom in a magistrate's court to be lenient, he said. So he sentenced him to six months, and advised him to go back to Georgetown, P. E. I., when he came out of jail, and to keep away from his friends and companions.—Moncton Transcript.

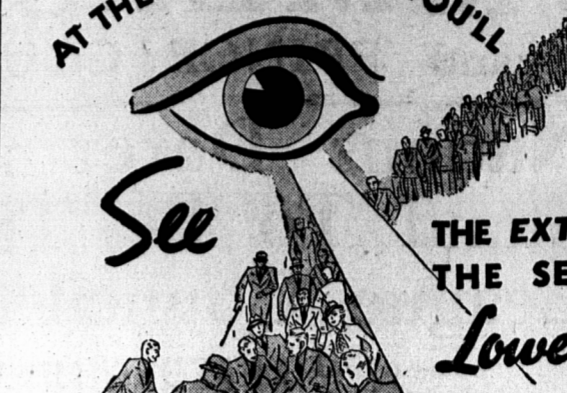
