**MAKE HISTORY  
MORE LIKEABLE**

Prof. McArthur of Queen's University Gives Teachers Advice On This Subject.

TORONTO, March 31.—One of the main faults of the present teaching of Canadian history is the insistence of many teachers that their pupils should memorize portions of the text-books in anticipation of examinations, according to D. McArthur, professor of Colonial and Canadian History at Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., who addressed the convention of the Urban School Trustees' Association here this week. Prof. McArthur said Canadian History was more cordially devoted husband and father, a disliked by students who graduated from the high schools and collegiate institutions than any other subject taught in the schools. The sons are Wm. A. of Summerside, John E. of the Province. This abuse of the text-book of interest, he said, and he characterized the teaching of a subject with a view to the examinations thereon as a vicious system. The remedy suggested by Prof. McArthur was that less attention should be paid to the history of constitutional development, and the growth of government. In this way he believed, the subject of Canadian history would lose a good deal of its present dullness. He urged the re-writing of many of the text-books and the discarding of others. He advocated the use of the kind of books that gave contemporary descriptions of Canadian life, such as the early explorers and in the descriptive works of travel in the early part of the last century.

Prof. McArthur said he would change examination papers so that a larger number of option questions should be incorporated in them and the teachers should be allowed a wider scope to enlarge upon special phases of Canadian development. This would lead to greater interest on the part of the pupils, he said. He declared that only those who had specialized in history should be permitted to teach it.

**ALEXANDER CAMERON.**

There passed peacefully to rest at his home in Summerside, Thursday morning March 22nd, Mr. Alexander Cameron aged sixty nine years. Although in failing health for some time, his sickness did not assume a serious appearance until some ten days previous to his death, which came as a shock to his many friends.

He was born at Wellington in 1859, and was a son of the late David Cameron and Annie McNeill. While still a child deceased with

his parents removed to Lot Eleven, where his father connected mills owned by the late Col. James Warburton. Mr. Cameron keenly lamented the death of the late Dr. Warburton, which occurred a short time ago, and spoke most feelingly of their boyhood years spent together in Lot Eleven.

Later his parents returned to Wellington, where he remained until some twenty five years ago, when he removed with his family to Summerside where by his industry and general good citizenship, he won the esteem of all with whom he came in contact.

He was one of the oldest and most experienced fox ranchers on the Island. In 1913 he assumed charge of the Pure Canadian fox ranch, where by his integrity and capability he raised this well known ranch.

Watching it grow from a few odd pairs of foxes to several hundred pairs. In 1924, owing to ill health he was obliged to retire from this position, but to within a few days of his death, continued to superintend the management of his own ranch.

He leaves to mourn the loss of a devoted husband and father, a sorrowing widow, four sons and five daughters also sixteen grandchildren. The sons are: Wm. A. of Summerside; John E. of the Province; George C. at Saskatoon, Sask.; George C. at home. The daughters are: Mrs. Joseph Clow Summerside; Mrs. L. J. MacDonald Mermaid Lot 48; Misses Kathleen, Gertrude, and Miriam at home, all of whom were at his bedside except Hillard J. who was unable to be present.

His funeral took place Saturday morning March 24th, at St. Paul's church and cemetery and was largely attended, services at church and grave being conducted by Rev. J. J. MacDonald. The pall bearers were: W. J. Lidstone, J.M. Noonan, J. J. McNally, Arch Sharp, Chas. McCarthy, and J. J. Gaudet. keen interest, and you will always be remembered as a charter member of our teacher Miss Jennie Nuttall.

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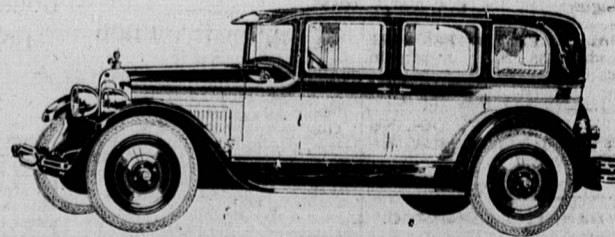
