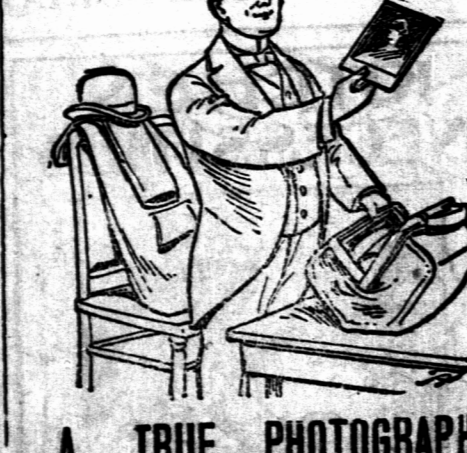

EASTERN NOTES.—On Sunday the 1st of Sept. a sight unusual for these waters was witnessed, the passing by East Point on their way to Quebec of four of His Majesty's ships of war, monsters of steel filled with intricate machinery and all the latest scientific requirements for the ready calling, the production of an inventive age, and a resourceful country. They were very different in appearance to the tall-masted vessels of many decks and many guns with which Nelson and Collingwood maintained the supremacy of the seas and sustained and extended the sphere of Britain's civilizing influence and power. Though "England's wooden walls" are no more, yet well they played their part and bequeathed to her walls of steel seas to police, and dominions to superintend of an extent unequalled by any other nation at any period of the world's history.—There is a good school of hake on the South Shore here now, and fishermen are landing large quantities. They get squid bait at present of which the fish are in pursuit. Though the squid is neither prepossessing in his appearance or gentlemanly in his behaviour, he is greedily devoured by the hake and when his ugly body is cut up it makes good looking and very tempting bait. Their visits to these waters are irregular and uncertain though they appear to come oftener and in greater bodies than formerly, no doubt in pursuit of some other fish. They are the exact counterpart of the devil-fish in everything but size, but appear to range over a more extensive area. While the latter dreaded monster, at one time supposed to exist only in the lively imagination of the French novelist, Victor Hugo has his haunts chiefly in the warmer tropical seas, the squid often frequents colder waters, though the first perfect specimen of the devil-fish in his entirety and hideousness captured by man, came ashore on the eastern coast of Newfoundland not many years ago, during a violent storm, and is now preserved in a museum in Washington. Since that time part of a large area covered with many formidable suckers was taken ashore by a boat's crew near the same spot, they having severed it from the body with an axe during a fight with the monster.—Threshing is now becoming general, John Alex.
