IN MEMORIAM

MAX M. COHEN.

The death of Mr. Max M. Cohen, the talented violinist which occurred yesterday at his residence, 48 Great George Street, will be learned with deep regret by our citizens.

Mr. Cohen who was twenty-seven years of age, was a native of Glasgow, Scotland, and came out to Canada eight years ago, locating in Montreal. He was at first in the employ of the Royal Bank of Canada, and later took a position with the Canadian Distributing Company. As representative of that Company on the Island he came to Charlottetown six months ago.

Mr. Cohen had served overseas in the Royal Air Force, and while on active service contracted a cold, which resulted in kidney trouble. He suffered from this from time to time, and about a month ago the attacks became so severe that he was confined to his bed. Recently his condition took a most serious turn, and the end came at 4 o'clock yesterday morning.

Mr. Cohen, who has been called away in the vigor of early manhood was well known here as a very clever musician. He was a graduate of the Royal Academy of Music in London, and was an accomplished pianist and violinist, the violin being his favorite instrument. All who heard him play in the churches and at various public entertainments will testify to his remarkable skill.

Mr. Cohen was a very intimate friend of Doctor Leo Frank, and had his health permitted would have taken a very prominent part in the Charles M. Shaw benefit concert. As it was he assisted in the preparation of the programme and wrote the comedy sketch which proved so enjoyable.

Mr. Cohen possessed a most attractive and genial personality and made many friends here. He was a member of the Masonic and Odd Fellows Orders, and very popular with his associates. Two months ago his mother and sister came out from Scotland to nurse him when his health began to fail, and these two only relatives in this country were at his bedside when he passed away far from his home land. His father is at present in Scotland.

The funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon at 3.15 from his late residence, to the People's Cemetery. It will be under the auspices of the Masons, and Rev. Mr. Maloney of St. Peter's Cathedral will be the officiating clergyman.

The bereaved relatives will have the deep sympathy of all in the great sorrow they have been called upon to bear.

Blind Paid Last Tribute To Sir Arthur Pearson

LONDON, Dec. 14.—Hundreds of blind men and thousands of other persons paid tribute today to the memory of the late Sir Arthur Pearson, for whom impressive services of an unusual character were held in Trinity Church, Marylebone, near St. Dunstan's House, the scene of Sir Arthur's work for the blind.

As the cortege passed St. Dunstan's group of blind ex-service men stood at attention in honor of the memory of the man who had devoted a large part of his life work in aid of the blind. Representatives of King George, Queen Mary and Queen Mother Alexandra, as well as numbers of men prominent in the publishing world, in which Sir Arthur Pearson's name was a power before he himself was afflicted, attended the services.

In addition, a special memorial service was held in Fleet Street attended by former associates of the publisher.

COMPACT FACTS, CANADA 1921

Few people realize that 26,411 Canadian ex-service men have been established on the land and are nearly all making good; that Canada's water-power development represents an investment of \$475,000,000, while the power produced would otherwise require 18,000,000 tons of coal yearly; or that nearly 85 per cent of the world's supply of asbestos comes from the province of Quebec.

The Natural Resources Intelligence Branch of the Department of the Interior, has just issued a revised edition of "Compact Facts", which contains in concise form, information regarding Canada; its area, population, trade and industries; their extent, capital invested, wages paid, values of live stock, principal crops and amounts produced; mineral resources and present production; also forest resources and forest products. Copies of the booklet are available on application to the Superintendent, Natural Resources Intelligence Branch, Department of the Interior, Ottawa.
