Sydney Plant To Turn Out Steel For Shells

SYDNEY, Aug. 5.—Steel to be used in the manufacture of a 100,000 shell over received last week by the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company at New Glasgow, will be turned out at the Sydney steel plant and will involve 2,500 tons, it was learned to night.
 Ever since the outbreak of the war the Sydney plant has been experimenting on a type of steel for shell purposes. The experts there have succeeded in producing a material which will meet the requirements in a satisfactory manner, it was stated.
 The steel is of high carbon content and a special mould was devised in connection with it. The Sydney plant is equipped for the production of the shell steel.
 Production of the material, it was said, will be proceeded with as soon as the New Glasgow plant is ready.

Australian Patrol For Britain

It was announced in Melbourne that Australia was building entirely from Australian materials a number of first patrol boats for Britain. The patrol boats which are wholly of Australian design are building in five shipyards. They will be launched in record time and several are now nearing completion.

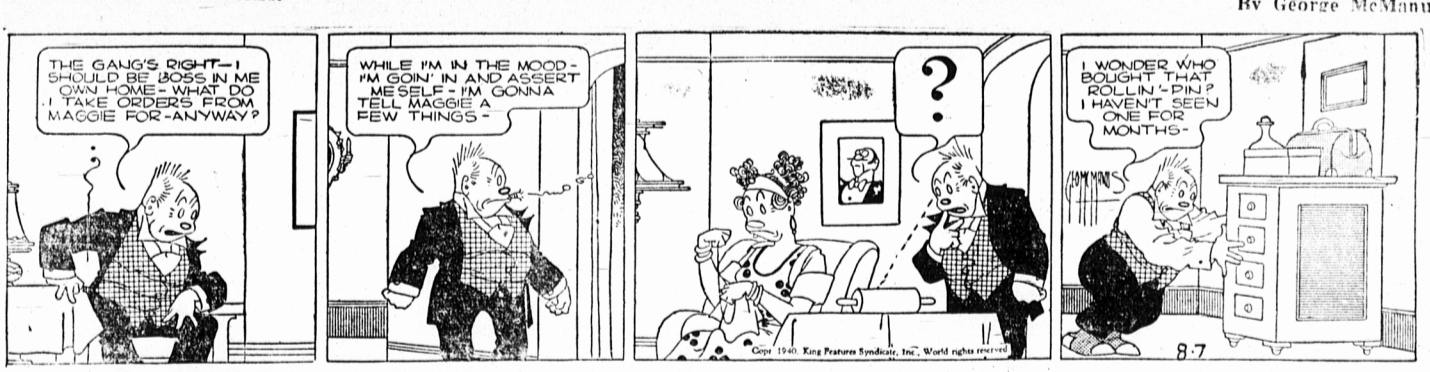
