Suitable Varieties Of Mangels

(Experimental Farm Note) Comparative mangel variety trials conducted at the Dominion Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S. clearly indicate there are significant differences in yielding capacity between varieties. There are six types of mangels, long, half-long, intermediate, tank-

ard, ovoid (oval) and globe. These again are subdivided according to colour, such as red, white and various shades of yellow and rose. Tests have shown the general superiority of those varieties which fall in the half-long and intermediate, either yellow, white or red. The rose types have proven rather variable, in many cases growing deep in the ground and being rooty and hard to harvest. Varieties of the half-long and intermediate types, as a rule, are smoother and more uniform than those of the long type. They do not break as badly when pulling and handling, which means that as a rule they keep better in storage. Pulling tests have demonstrated that it requires considerable more energy to harvest varieties of the long type than it does varieties of any of the other types. The globes and tankards are the easiest to pull, as they grow nearer the surface of the ground.

From the standpoint of yield and general suitability, varieties of the half-long and intermediate types are recommended for fairly deep, moderately rich soils, while on shallow soils the shallow rooted types as represented by the globes and tankards will probably be more satisfactory, with the tankards preferred. The following varieties, however, have demonstrated their general adaptability in comparative trials: Half-Yong and Intermediate—Danish Sludstrup; Tip Top (C.E.F.) and Half Sugar White. Tankard Yellow Tankard.
