

W.K.S. Boy Leads I. O. D. E. Exam.

The results of the "League of Nations" examination just concluded in the City Schools under the direction of the I. O. D. E. place Charles Hyndman, a West Kent pupil at the top of the list with 92 marks out of a possible 100.

The aggregate marks of the City Schools follows: 1, West Kent, 5,404 marks; 2, Prince Street, 3,256 marks; 3, Queen Square, 2,624 marks; 4, Rochford Square, 2,148.

The Daughters of the Empire supplied the teachers with such information as had a bearing on the subject well in advance and the question paper was set and corrected by members of the Order.

The ladies of this organization are to be congratulated upon the success of the project. A study of the organization of the League, what it has done to reduce armaments and to amicably settle international dispute, what it is doing to prevent the spread of disease and to relieve suffering and want, and what it is possible to do in the years ahead in social, commercial, and labor matters in an international way, should be of infinite interest to the student and should help awaken a new idea of world brotherhood.

Russian Conditions Quickly Analysed

NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 15.—"Little food, no shoes, terrible inefficiency, steady progress, great hope." That is an analysis of Soviet Russia by Miss Margaret Bourke-White, one of this country's leading photographers of industrial subjects, in her book "Eyes on Russia" just published here.

In her informal study of Russia and Russians at play and at work the author finds that the Soviets are going ahead at "staggering speed" and sees the Five Year Plan as "a great scenic drama being unrolled before the eyes of the world."

Although in North America and in Europe there is widespread interest in the Russian experiment, the interest of the Russian worker in himself and in the social and industrial undertaking of which he is part is no less great, says Miss Bourke-White.

"In this industrial age, if one understands the industry of a people, one comes close to the heart of that people," the author writes. "Russia is trying to do an astonishing thing. It is struggling to transmute an agricultural country into an industrial country, almost overnight; to do in a few short years what took a century in the West. Russia to me is a land of embryo industry. Things are happening in Russia, and happening with tremendous speed. I wanted to make pictures of this astonishing development, because, whatever the outcome, whether success or failure, the effort of 150,000,000 people is so gigantic so unprecedented in all history, that I feel that these photographic records might have some historical value."

"To my mind, the greatest hope of the new Russia is the capacity of Russians to learn quickly. If individual Russians are so impressive, so quick to learn, through the great mass of the people will gradually seep the new industrial spirit. It will not be done in five years. Any casual observer knows that so great a transformation cannot be accomplished in five years. Any visitor to Russia can see that the greatest drawback to the success of the industrial plan is the inexperience of the Russian people."

FABULOUS WEALTH BURIED LUKES TREASURE HUNTERS

LONDON, Dec. 15.—A Hindu named Dewan Lakshminchandra, now claims to know the exact location in the Punjab of a treasure said to be worth about \$500,000,000. This fabulous wealth has lain buried beneath the now deserted site of an ancient city for thousands of years.

The London Post says the Hindu is about to commence operations on the spot to recover the treasure and has struck a bargain with his Maharajah for a division of the spoil. The Maharajah has assured himself the best of the deal in advance, says the Post, but the Hindu, if his hopes are realized, will come into the useful sum of \$220,000,000.
