Premier King At Kentville

KENTVILLE, N. S., June 25 - Through the beautiful Annapolis Valley - the land of Evangeline - Premier Mackenzie King came to Kentville tonight for his farewell meeting in Nova Scotia. It proved to be a monster gathering, easily one of the largest which the Prime Minister has addressed, and his reception was enthusiastic in the extreme. The meeting took place in the heart of the apple growing country of Nova Scotia, the constituency of Hants-Kings. Great quantities of apples are shipped from the district to Great Britain. Mr. King seized the opportunity to stress the importance of promoting Empire trade, the budget with its provisions for increased British preference he spoke of as a great issue of the campaign, and he emphasized the point that defeat of the budget meant negation of the proposals contained therein.

The dawn of a new era has arrived, and on the seven seas of the world, the plume of smoke pouring from the funnel of a vessel may soon be forgotten. The report states laconically that 78 3-4 percent of vessels under construction ranging between 8,000 and 25,000 tons, are being equipped with Diesel engines.
