2.10 TROTTERS

COMMON ENOUGH.

The 2.10 trotting list is thirty years old, the first member of the distinguished company, the little black pony, Jay Eye See, having done a mile in 2.10 flat at Providence, R. I., in 1884. Two days later Maud S. trotted in 2.03 at Lexington, Ky. As the 2.10 list has grown the world's record has been lowered until it now stands at 1.58, made at Lexington by Uhan in 1912. Under a modern conditions it takes a 2.10 or better trotter to win even the slow class purses at important trotting meetings, and to show how this change had been brought about the following table, giving the yearly additions to the 2.10 list and the various holders of the world's trotting mark, is printed.

It will be noted that while Jay Eye See and Maud S. were 2.10 trotters in 1884 to the high wheel sulky, the mare's mark of 2.08 1/2 was not equalled until 1891, when Sanol cut it half a second over the kite-shaped track at Stockton, Cal. As that sort of course admittedly was faster than the oval over which the previous best performance had taken place, the records of the two naves generally are considered by horsemen of about equal in value.

In 1892 the use of the pneumatic tire sulky became general, and that fall Nancy Hanks did a mile in 2.04. Alix made it 2.04 1/2 in 1894, which stood as the best until 1900, when The Abbot looped off half a second to be the slowest watch of the official timers, the other two showing 2.03 and 2.02 1/2.

The following year Crescens put 2.02 1/2 on the books, and in 1903 Lou Dillon came from nothing to 1.58 1/2. However, in her trials against the watch, the chestnut mare was preceded by a runner to whose cart was attached a wind shield, while the other champions had only a horse ordinarily rigged in front of them.

Hence when Uhan trotted in 1.58 1/2 "in the open" in 1910, he was acclaimed unquestionably the champion trotter, and his 1.58, made in 1912, on far and away the best mile by a trotter.

That is the brief history of the 2.10 trotting list and the champions since those figures first were reached. The 2.10 horse now is seen in droves at every big trotting meeting, and frequently 2.10 or better is reached during a trotter's first campaign. It was this possibility that kept the price of "green" trotters up to a high mark, because big purses were offered for slow classes, notably the \$10,000 M. and M. at Detroit, while nearly every other Grand Circuit track offers from \$3,000 to \$5,000 for a similar class.

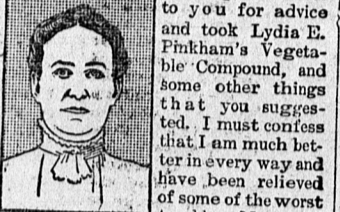

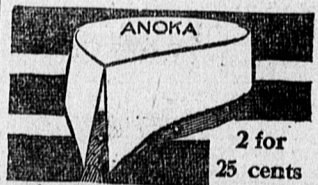

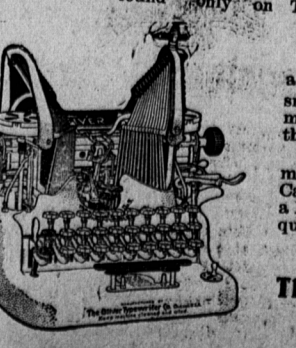
