—At a meeting of the Provincial Seed Fair Committee held at Summerside, a few days ago it was decided to hold the Provincial Seed Fair in Andrew's Show Rooms, Summerside, on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, March eight, nine and ten. The prize list was also gone over, and in accordance with the recommendation of last year's committee several changes made and the prizes were very much enlarged as compared with those of other years. MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.

(Continued from page 1.)

Mr. Geo. E. Ross, Zion Church, Charlottetown, was then considered. The clerk stated that he had cited the session and congregation of Zion Church to appear for their interests at this meeting, and his action was sustained. Mr. R. G. Sinclair represented the Presbytery work done by their minister, and the deep desire of the congregation to retain his services. Mr. Sinclair, having spoken in reply, the call was on motion, placed in the hands of Mr. Ross and accepted by him. It was moved by Mr. T. F. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. R. G. Strathie, and carried that the translation be granted and the pastoral tie dissolved to take effect on and after the 13th day of November instant.

Mr. T. F. Fullerton was appointed interim moderator of Zion session, and instructed to have the charge declared vacant as soon as possible after the translation takes effect. Presbytery expressed sympathy with the congregation, and the hope that they would soon have a settled pastor.

Mr. W. P. Archibald, representing the Presbytery of Truro and the congregation of Upper Stewiacke, stated that the call to Mr. Stirling was unanimous and urged his translation to that field. Messrs. C. J. Crowdis and R. Stewart represented the Presbytery of Pictou and the congregation of Scotsburn. Both spoke of the heartiness of the people in this matter, and presented reasons why Mr. Stirling should accept the call to Scotsburn.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, Presbytery adjourned to meet in the same place at a quarter to two o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this adjournment was closed with the benediction.

The many friends of Nelson Howatt, Miscouche, will regret to hear of his serious illness with congestion of the lungs. Latest reports last evening gave his condition as very low.

James J. Cassidy, aged sixty years, died at his home on Mechanic Street, Portland, Me., on Monday the 31st October after an illness of a year or more. For many years he was employed at the shops of the Boston and Maine R. R. at Turner's Island as a painter, but has been unable to attend to his duties during his last illness. He was a quiet man but has a large circle of friends who regret his death. Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons, James and Arthur, and five daughters, Mrs. Clara Cole, Mrs. Frank Teague, Miss Pearl and Miss Bertha Cassidy, and Mrs Winslow residing in Portland.

The funeral was held on Tuesday from his late residence, No. 38 Mechanic Street, Portland.—Exchange. Mrs. John T. Millman, Alberton, and Mrs. Walsh who resides in Boston, are sisters of the deceased.

At a meeting of the Executive of the Western Association of P. E. I. for the prevention of tuberculosis held in the council chamber on Monday evening last, the result of the recent inspection of hogs was the theme of an interesting and practical discussion. It was shown that in April 1906 this Association had asked the Town Council to enact a by-law demanding the inspection of milch cows and also for all animals slaughtered for sale within the town limits for human food. The first part of this request had been complied with, but the latter had not. The following resolution was moved by Dr. Tanton, seconded by R. H. McDonald and carried unanimously: Resolved that in the opinion of this meeting it is in the public interest that Provincial and municipal legislation be invoked providing for a system of domestic meat inspection that will place the products of the ordinary retail butcher and those offering meat for human food on a parity with those of the packer, as regards quality, soundness and freedom from disease. The following were appointed a committee to wait on the Town Council and present the claims of this resolution:—H. A. Compton, Dr. Jardine and R. H. McDonald.

Mr. A. Craise was appointed interim moderator of Brookfield congregation, and instructed to have the charge declared vacant as soon as possible after the sixth instant. Presbytery expressed sympathy with the congregation of Brookfield, and appreciation of their spirit in giving up their minister to engage in missionary work.

On motion it was decided that a meeting of Presbytery be held at Brookfield, and within the Presbyterian Church there, on Thursday, the 10th day of November instant, at 10 o'clock in the afternoon for the designation of Mr. Green, the moderator of Presbytery, Mr. John Murray, to preside and designate, Mr. Geo. E. Ross to preach, Mr. A. D. Stirling to address the missionary and Mr. R. G. Strathie the people.

The clerk read a communication from Mr. W. A. Mason, Richmond Bay, east, stating that he intends to resign his pastoral charge at the next quarterly meeting of Presbytery in order to facilitate re-arrangement in that part of the Presbytery. On motion this notice was laid on the table.

Consideration of Assembly's report was deferred until next quarterly meeting of Presbytery.

Mr. R. G. Strathie was appointed convener of Presbytery's committee on recruits for the ministry in place of Mr. Geo. E. Ross resigned. After discussion it was agreed that Presbytery assume the support of Mr. A. W. Thompson in the Demerara mission field in place of Mr. A. D. McKenzie, who has been compelled to retire on account of ill health.

Messrs. R. G. Sinclair and James Ross addressed the court on Home Missions. Presbytery decided to apply to the Board of Trustees of the Century Church and manse building fund for a free grant of three hundred dollars (\$300) for the Inverness mission field in Prince County.

It was moved by Mr. E. J. Hattie, seconded by Mr. A. Craise, and carried that in future the minutes of the Presbytery be printed, and a copy forwarded to each member within the bounds, the expenses to be paid from the Presbytery Funds; said copy of minutes to be in the hands of members at least ten days before the meeting at which they will be submitted for sustenance. Presbytery then adjourned to meet at Brookfield, on Thursday, the 10th day of November, instant, at one o'clock in the afternoon, for the designation of Mr. Green, for other business, of which public intimation was given, and this adjournment was closed with the benediction.
