THE POPE AND FRANCE.

Pope P. X is very naturally displeased with the strong measures taken by the French Government against the religious corporations in that country, and recently commented in very severe terms upon the relaxation of church and state in France. This attitude is probably not desirable, and certainly is not calculated to moderate the zeal of the Government in its policy of closing out the religious houses. Some of the cardinals are reported to believe that the Pope has spoken too freely in view of what may result from incensing the Paris Government. For if matters proceed further the famous Concordat may be abrogated, under the terms of which the French government agrees to pay some millions of dollars yearly for the support of the dignitaries and ecclesiastical establishment of the Roman Catholic Church in France. If these payments were cancelled France would cease to have any officially recognized and established state church. That is, the church would be placed on the same footing as it is in Canada or the United States, and would have to depend wholly upon voluntary subscriptions for its maintenance. No doubt the establishment would still be well supported, but indirectly the effect would be felt in Rome. Large expenditures are needed in order to maintain the Government of the Vatican, and these are met by the contributions of the faithful, of which, if we mistake not, nearly one half come from France. If the Roman Catholics of France were obliged to make good the loss of the Government subsidies their direct contributions to the Vatican would almost certainly be curtailed, but the Pope apparently has the courage to face these possible conditions. And it may be doubted whether any Christian church ever really was the better for a close connection with the secular power.

The latest issue of the Prince Edward Island Magazine has added to it the Educational Outlook, the two names are welded on the title page, and the two serials will hereafter be issued as one. This considerably increases its size and gives greater variety and interest to the Magazine. The Island Magazine has already in its five years of life attained a substantial foothold among the reading and advertising public, and the combination will largely extend its circulation. The first issue of the new series embodies a number of interesting articles in both its departments and is highly creditable to the editors. Among the writers of special articles are E. W. Hyndman, J. S. Clark, John McSwain, Judge Warburton, J. T. Clarke, G. J. McCormac and others. The illustrations are well executed and add to the value of the magazine. We wish the P. E. Island Magazine and Educational Outlook the large measure of success which it obviously deserves.

THE EASTER SERVICES.

ST. PETER'S.
 At St. Peter's Cathedral Easter was observed without any departure from the established traditions of this Church. The services were hearty and attended by large congregations. The number of communicants was also large. The sanctuary was in festival dress, the altar and lectern were decorated with plants and cut flowers. The music was rendered by a full choir. The services were as follows: Three celebrations of Holy Communion of which the last was fully choral. Celebrant, Rev. Dr. Hunt, preacher, Rev. James Simpson, text, St. Mark, 16:14. Music, Woodward's Setting of the Office. Organ selections, I know that my Redeemer liveth; The Heaven's are telling; Matins was said in the chapel. Evensong choral. Music, Tallis; Magnificat and Nunc dimittis, Holloway; preacher, Rev. James Simpson; text, St. Luke 24:14 to 16; organ music, Festival March, Driffield; Silver Trumpets, Vidant.

ST. JAMES' CHURCH.
 The Easter Festival music in St. James was the best heard there for some time. At the morning service the anthems "Awake thou that Sleepest, Simper; and "This is the Day," Charles Cook; were well rendered. In the evening the anthems "Hallelujah, Christ is Risen," Claret; and "My Soul doth magnify the Lord," A. H. Mann; were equally well rendered. Prof. H. A. Tanton presided at the organ and the choir was under his direction. The morning sermon by the pastor was on The Resurrection, and in the evening, Character, a condition for the vision of the Risen Christ. There were large audiences.

GRACE CHURCH.
 The services in Grace Church were especially bright and interesting. The Easter music was up to the high standard of past years and was well rendered by the choir. In the morning Rev. Mr. Lodge spoke on Paul's Kechatology. The striking feature of the sermon was that the resurrection is not a resurrection of this body but a spiritual body raised out of it and that this takes place very shortly after death. In the evening he spoke on John's Eschatology harmonizing the whole with the sermon of the morning.

ST. PAUL'S.
 The music under the direction of Prof. Earle was excellent and included in the morning Grand Te Deum, Matthews; Anthem, Christ our Passover, Buck; with solo by soprano and alto; Anthem, He is risen, Schilling, with soprano, alto and tenor solo and Kyrie and Gloria, Sr Arthur Sullivan. In the evening the service included a solo by Miss Warburton, and a tenor solo and
