Swimming Niagara (Exchange) Fifty years ago this summer, Matthew Webb, the English swimmer, lost his life in an attempt to swim through the whirlpool of Niagara River. From bruises on his head it was judged that he struck upon a rock and became unconscious. His swimming powers first received wide publicity when he performed the feat of swimming in the Thames from Blackwall to Gravesend, in 1875, and two weeks later by swimming from Dover to Ramsgate in eight and three-quarter hours.

These were preparatory to an attempt to swim the English Channel. At his first effort he was forced by adverse currents to return, but ten days later, on August 24, 1876 he accomplished it in twenty-one hours. Since that time, the Channel swim has been repeated by both men and women and for a time there was almost an epidemic of Channel swimming. In June, 1883, Webb reached this continent with the intention of performing the feat which cost him his life. Captain Webb was born in Irongate, in Shropshire, in 1848, and was thus in his thirty-sixth year when he made the Niagara attempt. He was formerly captain of a merchant vessel and thus came the title by which he was known. He was the recipient of one of the first medals given by the Royal Life-Saving Society for rescuing a sailor from drowning. At the time of the Webb attempt, Niagara was also in the public eye on account of the construction work on the Niagara cantilever railway bridge. Those were days of momentous bridge construction, as the new Brooklyn bridge had been opened on May 24 and work had begun on the cantilever bridge across the Forth in Scotland.
