# Yanks Sweep Series With Cleveland; Dickey Beamed

NEW YORK, July 24—(AP)—New York Yankees peeled off another victory over Cleveland Indians today, 4-1, in a listless affair in which most of the crowd might have fallen asleep except for the shock of a beating to Bill Dickey in the fifth inning.

The tall, lean catcher of the Yankees came to the plate right after Charley Keller had struck the 24th home run with one on and a pinch hitter for New York, Jim Bagby's first pitch, a fast ball, struck Dickey a glancing blow on the right side of his head and sent him sprawling in the dust.

He was able to walk off the field a few minutes later and said, "I was just knocked silly." Dr. Emmet Walsh, team physician, ordered him to a hospital for overnight observation. The doctor said he believed Dickey was only shaken up and not seriously hurt.

At Boston, after losing seven games in a row, Lefty Mickey Harris pitched the Red Sox to a 11-1 victory over Chicago White Sox in the last game of the series. Harris held the Sox to six hits, the visitors' only score coming in the ninth inning when Mike Kreevich hit a pinch triple into the right field corner with one out and scored on Jimmy Webb's fly out to Dom DiMaggio in centre field.

At Philadelphia, hammering three pitchers for 13 hits, including two home runs, Athletics walked St. Louis Browns, 9-7, for a sweep of their three-game series.

At Washington, the Senators capitalized on Hal Newhouse's wildness, an error and two hits to lead to a 6-5 victory over the Tigers and defeat Detroit, 6-5. The win gave Washington a sweep of the three-game series.

# Yankees Are Disproving Favorite Baseball Axiom

NEW YORK, July 24—(AP)—In addition to shattering various and sundry hitting records, the runaway New York Yankees are in the process of blasting one of baseball's favorite axioms about a pennant winner needing at least one 20-game winner among its pitchers.

Yanks have about as peculiar a mound staff as anybody ever saw. Even Manager Joe McCarthy admits it, though with considerable pleasure. "What I've got," Joe says, "is a whole lot of good pitchers."

No matter by what big margin the Yankees captured the American League flag, it is extremely doubtful they will go into the World Series with "20-games." Their only real candidate is Red Ruffing who now has 11 wins to his credit. But the veteran works no often-

than once a week, and he would have to win about every one of his starts from here on to strike that figure.

Here, as a matter of curiosity, are the won and lost standings of the 11 members of the Yank staff: Red Ruffing (11-3), Lefty Gomez (8-3), Marius Russo (9-6), Johnny Murphy (7-3), Ernie Bonham (6-2), Alex Donald (5-2), Martin Breiter (4-2), Norman Branch (3-1), Steve Peck (3-1), Charles Stanceau (3-1) and Spud Chandler (2-3).

Men who have been watching baseball for 40-50 years say they've never seen anything quite like that list. They think McCarthy probably draws his starting pitcher out of a hat. Nine of the listed have started at least one game, only Murphy and Branch having devoted their talents exclusively to relief chores.

# Trots mile In 1.58 3-4

OLD ORCHARD BEACH, Me., July 24—(AP)—Nibble Hanover, b.g. bay five-year-old from Westbury, N.Y., trotted into harness racing's hall of fame by breaking three world's records in the Grand Circuit's \$4,500 Goldsmith Maid Stake today.

The handsome stallion's first mile over the "kite" track in 1:58 3-4 was the fastest ever made by a stallion in competition and the fastest first mile ever trotted. By taking the second heat in 1:59, the son of Calumet Chuck and Justissima hung up the fastest two heats of trotting on record.

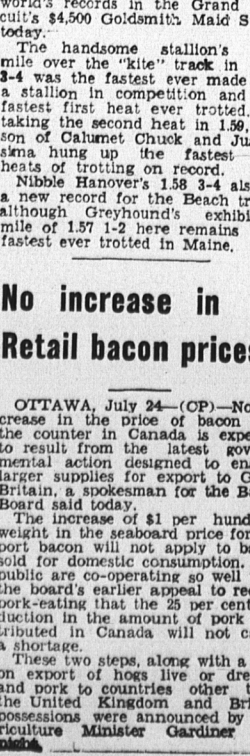
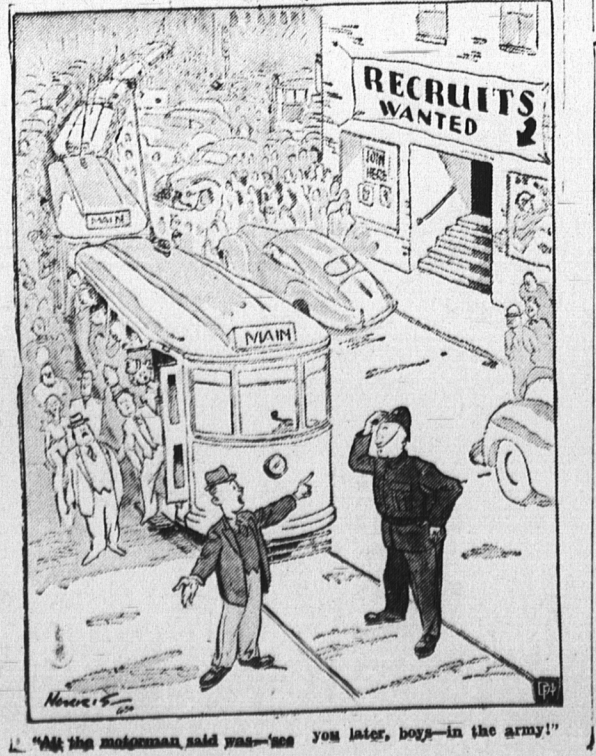
