Immediately after landing the passengers, the Bruce again left for Port Aux Basque, and is due to return tonight with another contingent of passengers. The Champlain has 750 passengers on board. It will be necessary for the Bruce to make one more special trip to transfer the remaining passengers.

RESIGNATION ACCEPTED

At the meeting of the P. E. I. Presbytery held in St. James Hall yesterday morning Rev. E. Smith's resignation of the pastoral charge of Cardigan was accepted. Mr. Smith will sever his connection with the congregation on and after the last Sabbath in June. Messrs Goff and McConnell commissioners from Cardigan made a very strong plea to retain Mr. Smith as their minister and spoke feelingly of the good work done by him in Cardigan. As a man and as a minister Mr. Smith was greatly beloved by everybody. The congregation made steady progress under his ministry and is in good shape and spirit. They earnestly requested Mr. Smith if possible to reconsider his resignation, and said that the loss of Mr. Smith, his wife and family would be greatly felt in the community and that the congregation desired that he should remain as their pastor. Mr. Smith thanked the commissioners for their kind words and knew that they were sincere, nevertheless, inasmuch as he had accepted a position on the staff of the Presbyterian Witness he felt compelled to adhere to his resignation. Rev. Malcolm McLeod of Dundas was appointed interim moderator of Cardigan session and D. B. McLeod of Montague.

INTERESTING SKETCH

The Victoria, B. C. Times contains the following sketch of the career of the late Ewen Bell, Indian agent at Clinton, B. C., whose death occurred there recently:—"Mr. Bell was born in Bell Creek, Belfast, P. E. Island, and came to the Pacific coast on the occasion of the great strike in Cariboo in 1862 among other ambitious and adventurous young men to seek a fortune. The journey in those days was taken by the Isthmus of Panama, and Mr. Bell could tell many an interesting tale of those stirring times. Having had a good business training he was largely engaged in mercantile pursuits at Lillooet and also Cariboo. When the gold fever subsided he took up his residence at Clinton, carrying on business, when fifteen years ago he was appointed to the Indian agency of Williams Lake. This position he held up to the time of his death. Although inheriting and possessing a splendid and robust constitution, the hardships he underwent travelling over an area of four hundred miles in all sorts of weather must have tended to undermine an iron frame. A few months ago he was seized with a stroke of paralysis, and although the tenderest care and attention were given him, and apparently he was steadily improving the final attack came on his retreating on Thursday, the 8th, when he succumbed to the great messenger. Few men had gained more implicitly the confidence of his fellowmen. He was a devoted and affectionate husband, a kindly father, the trust of friends.
