DOG AND CAT LANGUAGE.

Claims of Two Men Who Understand Their Language.

"All animals have their own languages," recently remarked Edward Boise, the chief dog catcher for the Chicago dog pound, says The Chicago Tribune. "It is true, as Charles E. Farcor of St. Paul says, that cats have a language, and I do not doubt that he can understand them. I speak a smattering of cat, but that language has but little attractions for me. Dogs, as a matter of fact are the greatest linguists in the animal world. Each breed of dogs speaks a different language or rather each breed speaks a dialect of the dog language. Cat is similar to the Spitz dialect of the dog language."

"From long association with dogs that are brought here I have learned the language and can converse intelligently with a dog of almost any breed," continued Mr. Boise. "I am afraid, though that the dog language I speak is to a great extent made up of colloquialisms and slang, because the dogs I meet here are mostly of the criminal classes. "He wags," he says, "dogs belonging to some of our best families, and I can understand them. The dogs of the street speak a lot of thieves' slang, which as yet I have failed to interpret exactly, although many of their forms of speech are ordinary dog. Perhaps the most eloquent of dogs is the common terrier. He seems to be cosmopolitan. The language of the terrier is extremely imperfect but forcible. The bulldog uses few words, but these are vigorous. "I am at work now on a dog grammar—a sort of Volupek dog language—using only the words common to all classes of dogs. I have not yet dared attempt to classify all the dialects, but have taken rat terrier as the basic language. The following few words are equivalent in English will suffice to show some of the commoner forms of expression among dogs."

The list of words supplied by Boise contained the following:
Gr-r-r-r—What are you doing here?
Gru-ugh-ugh-ugh—Don't try to take this bone from me.
Yough-yough-ugh—That boy shows some.
Yough, yough, yough, yough, you'll shake the stuffing out of this cat.
Oughou ough-u-u-w, ough-u-u, ough-u—That coon has climbed a tree.
Bow, ough, bow, ough, bow ough—Get out of this lot.

Charles E. Farcor of St. Paul, Minn., an imitator of animals, says human beings can understand cat language. Mr. Farcor not only claimed to understand cat language, but to talk it. He has studied the habits and utterances of cats for years. Here are some of the cat words he has learned:
Aallo—Request for food.
Lallo—Request for water.
Loo—Desire for milk.
M—Demand for red meat.
Meeal—Kitty wants cooked meat.
Pise-bl—Wants house meat and is applied to any food which kitty fondles before devouring.
Meauw—Uttered simply, is a greeting uttered fiercely and with the accent on "m," is an expression of hatred and defiance.
Miseuw vow, wow, yaiwoyow, tiow, yee-stayow—Denote of battle and is variously accented to tell of the progress of hostilities.
Parrife—Request to open door.
Purrive—The "I love you" of catland; when uttered with a rolling "r" and a rise on the last syllable is a call from a mother cat to its kitten.

Sir Edmund Barton's Retirement.
A pleasing incident in connection with the retirement of Sir Edmund Barton from the Premiership of the Commonwealth to become a judge of the Federal High Court was the presentation of an address and parting gift from the representatives of the Australian press attached to the Commonwealth Parliament. The relations between Sir Edmund and the press gallery were most agreeable and harmonious. The Hon. R. E. O'Connor, who accompanies Sir Edmund to the bench of the Federal High Court, is an old pressman, and for some years, during his early business period, was the leader-writer for a Sydney evening paper, The Echo. Mr. Deakin, the new Prime Minister of the Commonwealth, became a leader-writer for The Melbourne Age at the early age of twenty-two, and he has acted as its special correspondent in India and America.

James' Reminders.
A west of England clergyman, having allowed his church to get into a bad state of disrepair, was ordered to restore it. He commenced with the sounding board over the pulpit, and after putting it right he called in his coachman with a view to test it and made a speech from the pulpit.

A Wonderful Light.
A fast flashing beacon light that can be seen in favorable weather for more than forty miles has just been installed by the German Government upon the Island of Helligoland, in the German Ocean. It is the most wonderful in the world. The light used equals 40,000,000 candle power. The light lasts one-fifth of a second and repeats itself in five seconds. It illumines the entire horizon in that period. At forty miles distance the power of light flashes over the sea at the rate of 180,000 miles an hour. The German parabolic mirror reflector is used.

A GRAND SHOWING.
