in one of the bed-rooms on the second
floor caught fire from a gas jet, and the
fire spread over the room burning the
window casing, damaging all the wood
work, cornices and plaster work of
the interior of the room. A young
man named Fraser, who was in the
room at the time the curtain caught en-
deavored to put the fire out without
water, but only succeeded in burning his
hands. The other inmates of the
house hearing noise went to see what
the trouble was and were just in time
to save Fraser from a severe if not fatal
burning. The alarm of the fire was
given and the fireman promptly re-
sponded; but through the assistance of
some neighbors and friends, the fire was
put out just as they arrived and the
water from the hose was not turned on.
