CHURCH DIPS INTO TOO MANY THINGS

That's the Reason She Is Discredited Sometimes Says Rev. John Schofield--Congregation Union Will be Incorporated and General Changes Will be Made in the Constitution.

June 29--Rev. John Schofield of Toronto, was the principle speaker last night at the final session of the Congregational Union of Canada.

Mr. Schofield's address was on the subject, "Is the Church Failing?" One man, he said, and a clergyman at that, was of the opinion that the Church had failed her mission, and is now becoming superfluous in the world. In support of this, figures have been brought forward which show that no less than 18,000 persons have seceded from churches and religious institutions during the past year in England only.

On the other hand, however, some 283,000 new members were enrolled during the same time, and this was perhaps due to the Laymen's Missionary Movement which is spreading far and wide and doing good work.

NOTHING BUT RELIGION

The Church has not succeeded as she ought, the doctor proceeded, and this was probably due (in part, at least) to the fact that people were looking to her for all kinds of things only remotely connected with religion and with which, in his opinion, she ought not to meddle and when she failed in one of these minor things, people were ready to say that she was getting old and useless, and the Church had no right he thought, to mix with anything but religion, and above all things she should leave politics and liquor laws alone.

The Church, he continued, is being criticized by the Socialists, who blame her for the evils of society, and the social problems. But the church was not at the root of the matter, it was egotism in some form or other that was to blame. Let the church stick to the spiritual side of life, and when people realized that

this is what the church was made for they would cease to blame her for failures, and would agree that her mission is not yet fulfilled.

REORGANIZATION OF UNION.

A long discussion of the report in outline of the committee on reorganization took up the most of the afternoon, but the decision was finally reached that the union should be incorporated. An act of incorporation will be drafted by the executive ready for the next meeting, as well as an estimate of the needs of all departments for the year. The churches will then be appealed to, each one being informed what portion of the necessary \$20,500 she will be expected to furnish. In future the financial obligations of the union will include the salary of the general secretary; and expenses, travelling and otherwise, of secretaries, delegates, ministers, etc. coming to some \$3,500. This will be included in the apportionment scheme.

The executive was also asked to report on a plan for paying the travelling expenses of the visiting delegates.

OBITUARY.

At 2 o'clock, p.m., the 15th, June Mrs. Alexander McFarlane fell asleep in Jesus in her home on Melville Road near De Sable. Her funeral service was conducted by her pastor Rev. W. McLeod at 2 p.m. on the 17th and was attended by a large concourse of people, quite a number being R. Catholics. Probably over fifty carriages accompanied the remains to their last resting place in the cemetery at Argyle Shore. There her clay tabernacle was interred by the grave of her husband who predeceased her eight years ago. Her youngest daughter arrived home from Mass, second day before her mother's death and she was able once to whisper her name. Another son and daughter arrived the night after her death, leaving a brother and sister in Mass, unable to come. Mrs. McFarlane was a sister of Job Inman of Augustine Cove, James of Victoria, Major of Tryon and Mrs. Higgins of Melville Road. She was during the last seven years of the sixty-one allotted her delicate health, but patiently trusting in Jesus she proved a devoted wife and mother and left behind abundant proof that now she is amid all the glory of the redeemed in Heaven. The very large number of neighbors, some of them Roman Catholics, who during her last illness day and night came to her home if possible to assist her, and the large attendance at the funeral spoke of her manner of life as a good neighbor and Christian friend. Many sympathize with her daughters Lilla and Annie who lived with her. Mrs. John McKinnon, and the three other daughters and three sons and the brothers and sisters of the deceased in their bereavement.—Com.
