EAT MACARONI.

In midwinter when fresh vegetables are scarce and expensive, macaroni and spaghetti offer a pleasant and inexpensive solution of the vegetable problem. However, if macaroni is served often the way of cooking must be varied often or the appetite will soon tire of it.

Here is an excellent Italian sauce for macaroni spaghetti which makes a welcome change from the too familiar dish of baked macaroni and cheese.

Put into a saucepan one and a half table-spoonfuls of butter. Add small onion chopped fine and a half clove of garlic. Cook until they are all browned. Then add three table-spoonfuls of water in which the macaroni was boiled and a teaspoonful of beef extract. Add to this three or four of the dried mushrooms which can be bought at any Italian grocery. These should be soaked before being used. Let the sauce over it. Boiled macaroni with grated cheese and the boiled macaroni with grated cheese and pour the sauce over it. Boiled macaroni with minced chicken or any meat, and moistened with a white or brown sauce, makes a good luncheon dish. The meat should be chopped very fine.

Spaghetti au gratin is a simple dish. Boil the spaghetti in salted water until tender. Drain it in a colander and then return it to the saucepan with butter and grated cheese. Toss it over the fire until the butter is absorbed and the cheese melted. Serve immediately before the cheese has time to harden.

Roman cheese is the best to use for grating with either macaroni or spaghetti. It may be obtained at any Italian grocery, but the other grocers seldom keep it. At the Italian shops you will also find a substitute for spaghetti. It comes in small tins, usually six cents a piece. It has a far better flavor used with spaghetti than any home made or domestic sauce. Do not forget that Italy is the native land of macaroni and spaghetti and the Italians know best how to cook. Cooked as the Italians cook them and flavored with Italian sauces and Italian cheese, the somewhat tasteless macaroni and spaghetti of our tables become new and delicious dishes.
