The latest news, first of all.

Fraser T. Morrow, Alexandra, leaves today for Sussex, N. B. where he will take a cheese course in the Dairying school there.

S. A. McLeod, of Moore & McLeod, left Liverpool by the Adriatic on the 17th, and was expected to arrive in New York Tuesday.

There is an exhibition in Hazard & Moore's window, Sunnyside, a plan of the proposed Kensington Park. It is very explicit and gives an excellent idea of the park when finished.

J. D. Schurman of Freetown, leaves tonight for Georgetown en route to Togo, Bask. He will be accompanied by four other men from this Province who will assist him in Togo.

At last reports last night the winter steamers were both out in the straits in heavy ice and their positions were not likely to change until a change of wind. The mail special did not go to Georgetown last night.

On Saturday a meeting of the Fishermen's Union was held in Launching hall. The meeting was largely attended and many questions engaging the attention of the fishermen were intelligently handled. A motion was carried approving of the change of date for setting lobster fishing gear.

Theophilus Higgins, aged 78, died Tuesday night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Alexander P. Smith, 267 Metropolitan Ave. He was a brother of the late David Higgins, who was one of the Twenty associates, the founders of the town in 1856. He was born in Stanhope, Queen's County, P. E. I., and was a retired farmer. He is survived by two sons and four daughters, Cornelius J. and John Higgins, Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Charles S. Foote, of this town. Mrs. George Allen, of Denver, Colo. and Mrs. John McQuarrie, of Blair, Neb. The above is taken from a Hyde Park, Mass., paper of recent date. The late Mr. Higgins was an uncle of (ex-Principal) Lemuel Miller, of Charlottetown and was well known and highly respected on Prince Edward Island.

On the morning of the 19th inst. the community of Alexandra sustained a great loss in the removal of one of its old land marks, Thomas Wood. Mr. Wood was 74 years of age. Although confined to his bed for only a short time yet he has been in failing health for the past two years. Mr. Wood was of a quiet retiring disposition, but regarded by all who knew him as a man of sterling worth. He professed religion fifty-seven years ago and has thus been for over half a century very closely identified with all the religious interests of the community. Thirty-five years ago he was selected deacon of the Alexandra Baptist Church and through this long period of servitude he most faithfully discharged the duties of his office. He was always present at the regular services of the church. Even in the busiest seasons of the year the mid week prayer meeting always found him in his place in the Lord's house. His funeral on the 21st was uncommonly large and words expressive of the most tender regard fell from the many lips. He leaves a widow, two daughters and four sons. Mrs. Wm. Burhoe of Alexandra, Miss Gertie at home, Charles of Nebraska, Thomas of Brookfield, James in the West, and Arthur at home. Mr. Wood also leaves one sister, Mrs. John Burhoe of Westboro, Mass. and two brothers Benjamin and Joseph of Alexandra.
