HUNTERS' CORNER

How much do we know about trout? If you ask me that's a 98.00 question. Do the schools of immense sea trout, ranging anywhere from 4 to 7 pounds, that hover off our deep water sandbars and at the mouths of the larger rivers like the Morell, Fortune, Monk, Big Pierre Jacques, etc. ever essay the journey upstream to the headwater pools? I asked Doctor Smith from St. Andrews, N. B. a few pertinent questions about trout a couple of years ago. The Doctor is one of our leading authorities on trout and he was quite frank in admitting that the study of trout had been woefully neglected and that in regard to certain phases of the habits of trout we were still in the dark. He told me that the study of trout from now on was going to be conducted in a thorough and scientific manner.

they can pretty well look after themselves and chasing them is considered a waste of time. In the late summer of 1939 I was told by a King's County fisherman that on a calm afternoon he had anchored his motor boat about a half mile off shore at Rollo Bay. His attention was attracted to a disturbance on the water close to the boat. At first he took it to be a school of salmon but when he passed quite close to the boat their identity was not to be confused with any other species of fish. It is extremely doubtful if any of those big fellows, in any numbers at least, ever work their way very far up our tidal streams.

Another interesting point: Why do some mill dams consistently produce larger trout than others? I mean dams that are about the same size and are fished regularly each season. Whitlocks dam at Dundas (formerly Morrissons) has always been noted for large trout. In the old days when this dam was leased to a group of anglers from St. John, N.B. they had a sunken cage or fish well in which they kept their catch alive until they were ready to leave for the mainland. I have been told on the best authority that they didn't bother keeping anything under 2 pounds and trout up to 8 pounds were quite common.

Waller's dam at Waterville and Andrew's at East Royalty have turned out 4 pounders and 2 and 2 1/2 pounders are quite common. On the other hand Quigley's dam at St. Charles and McLure's (sometimes called Stricklands) at Murray River, from the standpoint of size and water volume should produce heavy trout but three quarters of a pound is the average weight for the larger run and seldom are any trout taken from those dams over the 1 1/4 pound mark. Leard's Mill at Riverton holds a lot of nice trout well flavoured and fat, but they seldom are taken from this water over a pound in weight.

Dissatisfied With Fight Decision

SYDNEY, N.S., July 7—(CP)—Frank Conti the Boston baltic, who dropped a split decision to New Waterford's dusky Joe Pyle here Friday night, will be back within three weeks to meet an unnamed opponent.
