THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC

TORONTO, July 30.—Moderate Southwesterly to westerly winds, generally fair and warm.

—THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was beautifully mild with bright sunshine; clear at night.

The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store tested thermometer with a northern exposure was 68 degrees above zero and with a southern was 70 above.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 83 degrees above zero and the lowest was 70 above.

The lowest temperature of the night was 65 above. At nine a.m. it was 71 above and at nine p.m. 70 above.

The tide will be high tonight at 8.45 and tomorrow at 9.54, it will be high tomorrow morning at 7.23 and Friday at 8.36.

The sun sets this evening at 7.32 and tomorrow at 7.30; it rises tomorrow morning at 4.40 and Friday at 7.29.

The moon rises tomorrow morning at 1.54. The last quarter of the moon was on Saturday, July 26th, at 5.59 a.m.

There will be a new moon on Saturday, August 2nd, at 8.58 a.m. The length of today will be 14 hours and 53 minutes.

AMHERST POLICE CAPTURE WALLACE LEGERE.

AMHERST, July 28.—The Amherst police have another feather in their cap. This time they arrested Wallace Legere, one of the young men implicated in the recent burglaries at Sackville and Shediac. The police have been watching the young man's home on Patterson street and on Saturday night they got into the place and found Legere there. The man raised no fuss when arrested, but walked quietly to police headquarters. After a talk with the chief, Deputy Chief Gunn and Constable Andrew McDonald, they left on the midnight freight and took their man to Sackville. Legere's two companions in crime, Frank Legere and Walter White, one from St. John and the other from an American city, were arrested only a few weeks ago in Amherst.

Walter McKinley, who was tried on Saturday last before Magistrate Walsh and was remanded until this morning, pleaded guilty to a charge of theft and was committed to stand trial before Judge Patterson, in the hearing of the county court. It will be remembered that McKinley was rooming with Bliss Walls, of Fishwick at the Glen house and that one morning last week Wells missed \$12 from his pocket. Information was laid against McKinley with the above result. McKinley was a young man about twenty years of age and arrived in Amherst early in the spring. He claims that his name is in Halifax, but that he was last working in St. John.

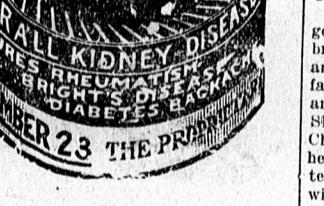

RESOLUTION CARRIED

On the motion of Mr. Riley, seconded by Mr. McKenzie, the Council then adopted the following resolution: That the city corporation of the city of Charlottetown is of opinion that a free site for an oatmeal mill should be provided for the proposed company by the City of Charlottetown, together with an agreement to exempt the said proposed company from city taxes and water rates for a period of ten years. And he further resolved that the city corporation of Charlottetown will recommend that legislation be asked for at the next session of the Legislature for authority to make the above concessions to the proposed company, said concessions to be granted under proper safeguards.

Mr. Riley then made a statement to the effect that for any delay that had occurred in this matter the city council were not responsible. The Council took the matter up as early as last March, and had tried hard ever since to bring it to a head, even having offered to pay to bring the company over here while the Legislature was last in session in order to discuss the matter with them and come to some agreement while the Legislature was in session so as to get the necessary legislation immediately passed. But the company delayed for several weeks and then they had come now at a time when the Legislature was adjourned, and the Council could do nothing in the way of granting immediate concessions to them. For that reason the City Council was not to blame in the matter.

His Worship said that the City Clerk would forward a copy of the resolution passed by the Council that night to the Colonial Corporations at Halifax and point out to them also that at the present time the Council could do nothing besides passing that resolution, but it would be the duty of the Council to see that legislation was passed at the next session of the Legislature to enable them to carry out their part of the agreement.
