REGISTRATION OF WEAPONS - Section 121A of the Criminal Code of Canada, requiring the owners of all revolvers and pistols to register same came into effect on January 1st of this year. Persons in this Province are required to register any revolver or pistol they may have with the nearest Detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, without delay, and secure a Certificate. The information required is the make, number and calibre of the weapon, and owners should not take same with them when going to register. Persons residing in this Province who are not British subjects must also register shotguns and rifles in the manner as provided for revolvers and pistols. Any person who has in his possession any such weapons should be reported to the nearest detachment of the R.C.M.P. or to the nearest police station. A permit to report same and obtain a permit from Insp. J. Fripps at Charlottetown. It is the intention that the registration of all weapons should be by the owner in person. However, if such procedure imposes a hardship on the owner, registration may be made by an agent or by mail. When any pistol or revolver is resold, given away or in any other manner changes ownership, the original owner should notify the Police and it must be re-registered in the new owner's name.

Sorrowing relatives, her son and daughters and many others drawn by the common bond of sympathy were present at the McGill Funeral Home, 346 Bloor street, west, where Rev. G. C. Pidgeon, D.D., of Bloor Street United Church, assisted by Rev. Thomas Eakin, D.D., of Knox College, conducted a simple service. Chief mourners were her son Donald, two daughters, Kathleen and Mrs. Mary Rogerson Baker of Markham, and her sisters, Mrs. Eliza McInnis of Toronto, Mrs. Bessie Waller of Charlottetown and Miss Lily Aiken, Truro, N.S. Many flowers were brought about the casket, bearing testimony to the high esteem in which Mrs. Sinclair was held by those who knew her. Hudson's Bay Company led off and as their offerings comprised 25,000 skins it will take at least two days to dispose of the skins. A large number of buyers are present in the Company's warehouse viewing the skins on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday of last week. They are present from London, Belgium, and other parts of the world. The skins are being taken in the collection which is the largest the Hudson's Bay Company have ever shown.

Derailment of passenger train No. 51 en route from Charlottetown to Souris yesterday afternoon caused painful injuries to four passengers in a second class coach which was hit by a freight coach turned over on its side when the locomotive and train left the rails about one-half mile west of Truro.

Mr. Winston Birt, Mt. Stewart, Bad scalp wound, necessitating nine or ten stitches. Mr. H. Reid Laird, Mt. Stewart, Head and body bruises. Mrs. Margaret Coley, St. Andrews. Head and hip bruises, and shock. Mr. William Douglas, Mt. Stewart, Slight injuries to hand and arm.

The accident happened at 4:05 p.m. The train, in charge of Ernie H. Douglas and Conductor P. Hughes, was running at schedule speed when it hit the curve. The cause of the accident was apparently a spread rail. The derailed engine carried all the cars with it off the track. Passengers in two coaches were injured. Two of the two last coaches left the rails, but remained upright. The baggage car was partly on its side.
