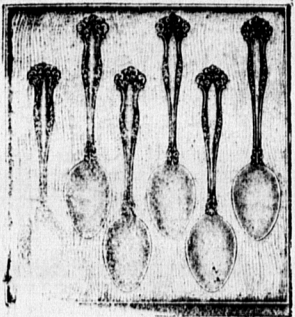

He very strongly advocated winter dairying. After the discussion which was taken part in by the chairman, Mr. Edwards, Mr. Henderson, Mr. William Clark and others, it was moved and unanimously carried that Mr. Edwards should correspond with the Commissioner of Agriculture regarding the formation of an Institute, to take in North Wilshire, Brookvale and Hartsville.
